

Executive Summary

Welcome to our Christ Church family and thank you for taking the time to consider being a part of a vibrant church that holds promise of great things. We are hoping you are called to our church. A core group of cohesive, welcoming, strong and caring individuals, who are a beacon and hub for the community at large awaits. We are a family, Trinitarians, people of the church.

In the following pages you will discover a community which offers opportunity for growth in the Christian faith, using many key elements which are Spirit lead. It is through a spirit of shared humility, shared ministry and shared leadership combined that we have built a solid foundation for our church community. People from many different communities and neighborhoods are drawn to us because there are many occasions to use one's gifts and talents to volunteer in a multitude of different capacities. Our family consists of many generations who were brought together because of shared values and an appreciation for rich Christian education; many have remained a part of our congregation for upwards of thirty years. New members are welcomed into our family and quickly become part of an intergenerational exchange which is a fundamental component of our congregation.

We are proud of our dynamic Sunday School and Youth Group where our youth leaders not only impart Christian values but put them into action in areas of social justice and the environment. Our plentiful church garden is an example of one such effort, whereby the youth helped plant and harvest vegetables to donate on a weekly basis. Early this fall, the children participated in a water walk to raise awareness about the lack of basic life sustaining measure in our First Nations communities. In November, the youth will further this cause by offering a fund-raising lunch in support of PWRDF's effort to provide potable running water to First Nations families. As well, they will be participating in a walk to raise awareness for and dispel the stigma of Mental Health.

Finally, we are innovators of change and development. We are proud to be the first church in the province of Quebec to offer a Parish Nursing ministry, which is not limited to serving simply the congregation, but the community at large.

We pray that you will feel called to help us to stretch and grow in our faith and in our community. Through a conscientious mutual investment, we are confident that together we will continue to serve God and to act as a bridge to a broader, more diverse future.

Our Place in the Diocese and Archdeaconry

Members of Christ church have had the privilege to attending the Fresh Expressions series which was offered in the Winter/Spring of 2017. Besides being an enriching experience and an opportunity to connect with the wider West Island Anglican community, it allowed for active discussion regarding innovative approaches to church. The approach to outreach is presented as an opportunity to explore alternative ideas of traditional church structure, such as fellowship around the theme of "church cafe" among other ideas, which is in line with CCB's focus on community partnership. Existing forms of service such as Messy Church were also discussed, including the possibility of partnering and collaborating with other churches in the district in order to share ministry and minister to as wide a population as possible.

Church occurs in pews for a select few; attendance at church in our own and in neighbouring communities validates this. By casting the net on the other side of the boat through such efforts as those discussed in the archdeaconry meetings, we run the good risk of welcoming the wider community which span multiple generations.

CCB remains open to exploring other forms of service with the ultimate vision to follow God's leading and carry out His will in ministry.

In order to make Christ Church more inclusive of people with disabilities we have embarked on an **Accessibility Project**. With the help of an architect and a structural engineer, a proposal for an elevated walkway, a handicapped washroom and an elevator has been drawn up. Submissions have gone out in search of funding in the form of grants to cover most of the cost. This project is well supported by the parish and although it looks like it may take a few years to complete we know that it will be an asset not only to Christ Church but to the wider community.

Our History

The congregation is modest and committed. There are many elderly members, some of whom are no longer able to attend services. While growth is not rapid, several young families joined recently, and we need to encourage these families to grow within our community.

Parish Life

Worship Pattern

Currently Christ Church offers two services on Sunday. The first service at 8:45 uses, by choice of the attendees, the BCP. There is no music at this service but there is a period of welcoming and communion. The attendance for this service ranges from 5 to about 15. It is offered in the intimate setting of our chapel.

The second service beginning at 10:15 uses the BAS. Attendance ranges from 40 to 50 parishioners with significantly more at festival services. Both traditional and contemporary music, led by our Choir Director Mr. Earl Wilson, are sung and enjoyed. The format of the 10:15 service includes an introductory welcome, a children's time, an announcement period then usually a communion service. The congregation is open to Morning Prayer at this time as well as a variety of alternatives such as presentations and speakers.

The later service offers Sunday School. There is the opportunity for individual prayer and Laying On of Hands during the 10:15 service. (This can also be arranged following the 08:45 service by speaking with the priest.) This important ministry offers confidential prayer on behalf of those coming forward, or for another person. The Prayer Team each Sunday is made up of one or two individuals. Children are welcomed to receive Holy Communion at both services. Baptisms normally take place as part of a regular service. Special services are offered at Easter and Christmas.

Other special services include a summer ecumenical service held on the waterfront, a Sunrise service held on Easter Morning also by the water, and various services over Christmas and Easter.

Paws and Pray is a monthly worship service unique to Christ Church that has been very well received by the community, particularly those whose primary and significant companions are dogs. This service has opened the door to the community in a poignant way. People come from all over the West Island and beyond to enjoy fellowship with their dogs and fellow dog owners. The theme of the service speaks to the connection between humans and the creation. Representatives from Rosie Adoption Agency are usually present to promote the adoption of dogs. There are treats and water for the dogs and communion for their owners. This service has become a hallmark of what CCB has to offer, and we value the connections we have made with the extended West Island community (and their dogs).

Christian Education

Children

Children of CCB, both regular attendees and visitors are welcome to partake in CCB's vibrant Sunday School which is led by two committed Sunday School teachers, Ingrid Gellis and Judith Quinn, as well as many parent volunteers on an alternating basis. There are between 8-10 children in attendance consistently and they enjoy a multifaceted approach to learning about The Word and deepening in their faith. Godly Play is used as well as theme based activities such as teaching about The Lord's Prayer, or a focus on PWRDF. Themes around Easter, Christmas, Pentecost, Remembrance Day, etc. are also explored and elaborated on creatively through music and plays. Another vital element of the children's ministry is their involvement in the church garden. Through the loving and capable hands of our Sunday school teachers children help to plant and nurture the garden at the beginning of the season and then participate in harvesting as the season progresses. Produce from the garden is then donated to selected community organizations. This year, the Sunday School is working with an agriculture student to grow the garden both in size and in harvest.

Adolescents

A lively and very busy youth group program is available to youth in the community which extends to friends and family of active church members. It is led by a very committed, talented and blessed individual, Angelina Leggo, whose calling it is to work with youth. This too is offered in terms of theme based programs. Last year the CCB Squad launched their youth group through a cooking theme. Issues of social consciousness are explored through these themes. As they explored and experimented with food from around the world, they also baked for St. Michael's Mission and hosted an international lunch for the congregation. This year, the focus was on messages related to anti-bullying. It was a canvas to explore and discuss about self-esteem, about being a victim or a bystander, etc. They learned lessons about prayer, developing community and connections through talking, exchanging and sharing as well as through games. The youth also partake in special services such as Christmas and other theme based liturgy and have also participated in the choir. Very recently (August 2017) they all participated in a 2 night camping expedition at a national park and enjoyed fellowship and Sunday Service on the dock Sunday morning prior to their departure home, among many other activities such as hiking, foraging, etc.

Preparation of Candidates for Confirmation

Over the past several years, candidates have been prepared for confirmation based on the assessment of their readiness by the priest. There is no arbitrary age at which this sacrament is offered, but a careful consideration of the individual's maturity as a Christian and capacity to understand and appreciate the process and the objective involved in the sacrament.

Education has taken different forms. The priest has met individually with families and sponsors and prepared the candidates in a family based setting with some meetings in the church. The most recent confirmation in 2014 involved a small group of candidates with a church based preparation led by the priest and supported/assisted by the then priest in training. The guide used for Communion preparation was, "Life in the Eucharist".

Reception of the sacrament of Holy Communion is considered a separate issue, and is at the discretion of the family and the priest. At CCB, Confirmation is not a prerequisite for receiving the Communion sacraments.

Music Programme

Our music program is comprised of a small group of dedicated choir members in a traditional choir, directed by a highly-talented, formally-trained musician. Choir members appreciate a solid programme of vocal training. The music includes a variety of interesting arrangements to classical and some contemporary hymns. Instruments include piano, organ, and occasionally drums and guitar. All are welcome in the choir or just to participate in choir practice. There is great opportunity for growth within this ministry.

Outreach through Music

Under the guidance of our Music Director, CCB has been hosting for a few years an annual music series the "Concerts du Quartier". This showcases highly-talented professionally trained musicians of all genres. Concerts generally have themes and there is an informal meet and greet or "après concert" afterwards. Our esteemed choir director also offers music lessons to children and adults.

To Nurture People's Sense of Connection between Faith and Daily Life

The coffee ministry at the end of the service is where people's faith and daily life coincide. Having been fed and nurtured through the Word and the liturgy, which always allows for moments of quiet contemplation and reflection, members are now open to discuss, to share and to have meaningful interaction about their lives and their faith. It is here where outreach between congregants occurs. Other events which encourage this connection are any events where meals are shared after a service, during Lenten lunches, at Christmas, during Vestry or other special events. Fellowship over food is a pillar at CCB.

The prayer chain is another such connection. As people have needs that they would like prayer for in their daily lives, they turn to their faith community for prayer and comfort.

Lastly, there are activities which combine the efforts of those utilizing various locations of the church and the church community. For example, The Girl Guides have been involved in organizing and serving during the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper. Several local churches

participate in organizing the Lenten Lunches. The annual church corn roast which is held outdoors welcomes passers-by and any who live in the community to a welcoming celebration which in the recent past has included activities for children such as bouncy castles and crafts. The same is true for the "Back to Church" Sunday BBQ which is also held outdoors and welcomes all.

Signs That People Are Deepening in their Faith

There are signs throughout the church that parishioners are growing in their faith. We will describe by age group, as the spiritual growth trajectory differs throughout the ages and stages of life.

Christ Church is home to The Still Presence Spirituality Center which used to be run by the priest and the honorary priest. The 60-90 minute sessions on Monday evenings aim to help deepen people's faith through guided meditation, heart talks (short theme based anecdotes which promote reflection and introspection) and sometimes activities such as yoga. Still Presence is unique to CCB and as a result has attracted people from all over the West Island and beyond. Currently there is no priest leading this and thus the themes and focus have been amended. Once an incumbent is in place, we wish to continue to promote and to grow this ministry, returning to its previous format, as it has nurtured and strengthened people's lives as well as given them a safe place to explore their spiritual connection and to become aware of their spiritual path.

Youth who are involved in the youth group are growing in their faith, in their sense of awareness and commitment to outreach. It is evident in their care and regard and sense of community and belonging to each other and to the church.

Children are curious and eager especially during Children's time which is a segment at the beginning of the service dedicated to introducing children to the gospel theme of the day. The priest gathers the children at the front of the church and exchanges with them directly and intimately, often laying the groundwork for the lesson they will experience during Sunday School. They are well connected to their Sunday School teachers and well-loved and regarded in return. They feel at home in the church and it is evident during children's time, when stories are shared and questions are asked of them that they are thinking and reflecting about the lessons they have learned.

Adults, especially those who are participating in discussions surrounding Fresh Expressions and Re-Imagining the Church demonstrate a deepened faith in that they have a desire to see the liturgy continue despite declining numbers and wavering financial stability. They show faith that church in some form can and should continue despite some very real obstacles. They can openly engage in discussion about new and non-traditional

approaches to the concept of church; to depart from what is known and safe and consider other alternatives in the name of Jesus Christ.

Those who attend Bible study also state that their faith has deepened through study, exchange and discussion.

Lastly, all who have a leadership role in the church and those who assist on various committees naturally express their faith through action.

Pastoral Care Ministry

The three main ministries that answer to the call of pastoral care are; Parish Nursing, services offered at Residences and Sunday Healing Prayer Ministry.

The **Healing Prayer Ministry** is offered every Sunday during the service. Members of the prayer team are available to pray individually with those who express a need. Laying on of hands can be a part of this ministry as well. It is confidential, and lead by a team of committed and faithful members.

CCB is blessed to be the home of the first **Parish Nursing Ministry** in the province of Quebec. It is run by a team of three members, but one Registered Nurse (Lisa-Anne Migliaccio, RN, MScN) who acts as both clinical coordinator of the PN ministry for the church and the Anglican Diocese and as the primary parish nurse for CCB and St. George's, Ste-Anne-de-Bellevue. The PN offers workshops about health and wellness matters, offers private and confidential consultations in person and by phone about a variety of health concerns and offers education, advocacy, and guidance about all health matters. As well, she offers assistance and advocacy to their family members during hospitalization. She is available to pray about health matters and to visit upon request of the member with or without the priest.

The incumbent has been offering pre-consecrated communion at **Services at two Seniors' Residences** (the Beaconsfield Manor and the Sunrise).

Volunteers

Although not a formal ministry, the work of many committed members of our church cannot be overlooked. There are members of the congregation who routinely drive people to places such as doctor's appointments, to church, to the grocery store, etc. They accompany them to appointments and spend meaningful time with them. They are the unsung heroes of the church who quietly and humbly minister to others in a selfless and generous way.

Outreach

Still Presence and Parish Nursing described previously extend beyond the CCB.

St Michael's Mission

Food, clothing, toiletries and other basics required for daily living are donated by members and delivered to St. Michael's Mission by a devoted a committed member of the congregation.

Christmas Baskets

Formerly, members would shop for groceries and deliver baskets to selected families in the community. This year saw a change to this process. Instead of buying groceries, families were given grocery cards with a sum per capita to shop for their own groceries. This change was made in the best interest of the families who have different cultural customs and unique likes and dislikes related to food.

Amy Molson Camp

Yearly, to prepare children for summer camp, the congregation offers the contents of "ditty bags" which contain things that a camper would require for a positive camping experience. Items include toiletry needs as well as some fun things.

Christmas Stockings

A ministry where gifts are given in handcrafted stockings to young single moms.

White Gifts

Offered as part of our Christmas baskets, members buy a gift according to the age and sex of the recipient.

Lenten Lunches

On Wednesdays during the period of Lent, CCB basement buzzes with activity as we host lunch - soup, bread, dessert and coffee/tea for the cost of 7\$. Several churches in the community take turns to provide the food and the staff.

Note: A **Parish Survey** was undertaken in the Fall of 2016. The results appear in this document as **Annex B**. It offers useful insight into the thinking of CCB parishioners.

Housing

There is a Diocesan scale for the housing allowance. There is no rectory.

Grounds

The church building stands raised on a sloping corner lot, one block away from the village centre. The lot is mostly lawn with some borders and mature trees. We have our own parking lots, including handicapped spaces. Parts of the grounds are being used for a parish-garden project to grow vegetables which are donated to local shelters.



The Area in Which We Carry Out Our Ministry

Our parishioners are drawn from the many small towns in the area of Montréal West Island and Ile Perrot.

Description of Our Area - Welcome to West Island!

The West Island is one of Montreal's most preferred residential areas. Approximately 30 minutes' drive from the city, it is easily accessible by the main public transportation systems: Pierre Elliott Trudeau International Airport in Dorval; highways 20 and 40; train and coach services to Ottawa and Toronto; 2 local train services and a network of local bus services which connect with the downtown buses and Metro underground system.

The area is made up of a number of small cities, some of which are part of the Greater Montreal agglomeration, and some of which are independent of it. Beaurepaire is part of Beaconsfield which is bordered by the St. Lawrence River to the south. The confluence of the Ottawa and the St Lawrence rivers is at the western tip, at the rapids of the picturesque city of Ste-Anne-de-Bellevue.

This is an area of tree-lined streets, parks and playing fields, pretty village shopping areas (Valois, and Ste-Anne-de-Bellevue and Pointe-Claire Village near the water), and large shopping malls (Fairview in Pointe-Claire north of the 40, Sources off the 40 in Dollard-des-Ormeaux, and Dorval Circle off the 20), libraries, cinemas, restaurants to suit just about every style and taste. If you are interested in local-grown produce, there is a weekly Farmer's Market in Ste-Anne-de-Bellevue, and you can pick up produce fresh from the fields at the MacDonald Farm Campus, a local outpost of the McGill University Agriculture programme. There are many different styles of residences - individual homes and apartments, including seniors' residences and senior care homes, as well as many 'desirable' properties along the waterfront. The water access is used by a number of yacht and kayak clubs and parasailing is also popular. The numerous beautiful waterside public parks are well-maintained and make pleasant venues for entertainment during the better weather. 'Shakespeare In The Park', and musical offerings of all genres from professional musicians are very popular. There is a sandy beach at Cap St-Jacques in Pierrefonds, where the water quality is monitored by the City of Montreal, and swimming under life-guard surveillance.

This is the place to keep your whole family in form! Why not take up a new challenge at one of several sports arenas - or enjoy Olympic-level coaching at one of the indoor pools - or relax, make friends and party at one of the many (summer!) outdoor community pools. You could play a round of golf in the summer and cross country ski or toboggan the same area in

winter – and downhill skiing for all levels is close-by. Whatever your sport, you are likely to be able to find it here.

With an eye to your health, the Lakeshore Hospital in Pointe-Claire has an Emergency department, and many outpatient clinics. There are several walk-in clinics for those who do not have access to their own doctor. Numerous specialists have offices in the West Island area, so it is not always necessary to go into Montreal for their services. The new MUHC hospital complex is easily accessible by direct train to Montreal; alighting at Vendome station there is a short walk to the entrance. The West Island also has its own community-supported palliative care facility.

There is no shortage of cultural events in the area – cultural centres and libraries regularly host musical events, plays for the family, and speakers on a multitude of topics, as well as rotating art exhibits from local clubs. And for your intellectual stimulation there are many Continuing Education courses offered by local colleges and school boards.

There are French and English Schools from Kindergarten to Grade 11. For details of accessibility and to enroll, it is best to deal with the School Boards directly. After High School, students attend CEGEP for 2-3 years before entering University. The French-language College Gerald-Godin is on the waterfront in Ste-Genevieve in the north, and the English John Abbott College is in beautiful grounds to the south-west. Students travel in from many parts of Montreal and much further around the province (John Abbott has on-campus student lodging and a network of homes willing to lodge its students), while a fair number of West Island students prefer to travel into Montreal using the public transport. After CEGEP there are a number of Universities offering courses in both official languages in Montreal.

However, in spite of an appearance of wealth and well-being, under the surface we are aware of an increase in local food-bank use and growing numbers of homeless people - many young people who get by sleeping on friends' couches and so are almost invisible as they are not actually on the street. There are homes for youth needing a break from their families, and a women's shelter. There are several community kitchen projects. There are clothes and furniture recycling stores, and many drop off points for unwanted clothing items. Efforts are being made to collect and redistribute good food that would otherwise be thrown out from stores at day's end. The need for Christmas baskets does not diminish, and our church community continues to be involved in that effort and in the provision of stockings of gifts for unmarried Moms, and toiletries to be given to children going away to camp in the summer. Throughout the year we support St Michael's Mission and On Rock food bank.

Our Expectations of Our Next Priest

We are seeking a leader with passion and drive. A person deeply committed to Christ and to His congregation.

The chosen candidate will be a leader capable of bringing out the gifts and talents of those in the congregation and one who has a passion for working with others.

Since we consider communication important, the desired candidate will have a gift for sharing from his/her personal experience and a gift for listening. These gifts are extremely crucial when dealing with our aging population and in the area of Pastoral care and outreach. These areas can often be a challenge when other commitments take up so much time. We are looking for a priest who has a strong desire to meet those challenges. In order to facilitate outreach and full participation in the community, having ability to communicate effectively in French would be a definite asset. Diocesan resources can be provided to assist in improving facility in French.

The ideal priest will also possess strong administrative skills and strong people skills. As with most parishes the office is busy and at times, a very demanding place. Being available to work within this environment and to be part of a team cannot be overstated. As with most parishes, each individual brings to their own Christian community a personal vision of what community means and each has their own personal expectations. Embracing the diversity of thought and vision within our community will be a rewarding experience.

We are a small congregation with a desire to grow. We are also a very welcoming parish that is looking for an incumbent with a certain charisma and presence who can inspire on a personal and spiritual level within our diverse community.

The new rector will be an excellent teacher, leading by example and mentoring others. This individual will understand and recognize the potential in our children and youth and will enjoy working in an environment that will support and nurture their growth. The desired candidate will be expected to develop and implement programs that will support our upcoming leaders of tomorrow as well as the other various ministries at Christ Church, Beaufort.

Our church maintains a tradition of involvement with community outreach in various forms. We view the various ministries at Christ Church as opportunities for growth in and beyond our parish. Outreach in the broader community will need to be supported by our new incumbent.

Music is a key component in our 10:15 AM Sunday morning service. We are looking for an individual who has a joy and love for music and who will find excitement in embracing different genres; and who will discern opportunities for all members of our community to express their faith in various forms. Our concert series has brought to Christ Church many talented individuals and this has also been a form of outreach for our community. Music is vital to us.

We are also looking for an individual who has the ability to deliver sermons that are inspirational and encouraging and to do so in a clear and succinct manner. The chosen candidate should be comfortable using the Book of Common Prayer and the Book of Alternative Services.

And finally, the incumbent will be expected to work with the wardens and deputy wardens, the Visioning Team and the Parish and to lead and encourage us on our journey.

Stewardship

Christ Church Beaurepaire's revenue sources are varied. The primary income source is from parishioner giving (weekly or monthly envelopes or ad hoc offerings). Revenues are also generated from parish hall rentals, church rentals, two "rumble jumble" sales (rummage sales featuring clothing, household items, paintings and baked goods), Lenten lunches, and also from the sale of Fundscrip cards. Another significant source of income for the church comes from the work of the Estate Sales group.

To explain further, all of the sale proceeds generate income for the church. Fundscrip cards is a way for parishioners to help the Church while using store-specific gift cards. For example, a person can buy grocery store gift cards with a value of \$100 and receive \$100 worth of value of items purchased. Fundscrip pays the Church a percentage of the sale amount – which varies by store. The Estate Sale group consists of a number of dedicated parishioners who help individuals who are leaving their current homes. This group stages the household items for sale in the homeowner's residence and manages the sale. For this service, the Church receives a minimum amount and a commission on the amount of sales generated. This has proven to be an excellent generator of funds. (It is also a form of community outreach as well.)

The status of church finances is reviewed in detail and the year's budget is tabled and voted upon during the Annual Vestry meeting. The usual practice is to have the meeting following a Sunday service. The Annual Vestry meeting is always associated with a buffet lunch prepared by parish volunteers.

The approach to the status of the church finances during the rest of the year has varied significantly in recent years. In some years, an interim detailed financial position is offered, in others, the only financial detail is presented during the Vestry meeting.

In some years the Church has needed to reach out to Parishioners during the year and ask for additional financial support. In some cases the envelope secretary has issued "Interim Statements" to parishioners as a way of providing the status on personal giving.

When the church has faced significant expenditures, normally communication pieces are prepared and presented to the congregation asking for their support. For major expenses, for example, replacing the roof, an ongoing financial "thermometer" is displayed in the Narthex as encouragement to show out progress until the project has been completed.

In some years Christ Church has asked Parishioners to give a non-binding commitment for the following year. The Corporation issues an overall note outlining our financial position and includes a form on which the Parishioner can indicate their level of planned giving. In years when this practice is followed, it is usually done in November – December. The purpose is to facilitate the setting of a Parish Budget. Since only about 55% to 60% of Parishioners actually fill out the form, often the corporation has to estimate revenues in order to establish a new budget.

There are opportunities to do more in the overall area of stewardship. This would include looking at the approach(es) other parishes have used and perhaps following suggestions or attending a course offered through the Diocese.

The above is simply intended to give the reader an overview of our current approach and Christ Church is open to exploring other ways of responding to Stewardship.
