The Convening Circular

Directions to Synod

The business meeting of Synod will take place at Christ Church Cathedral, which is located at 635 Rue Sainte-Catherine O, Montréal, QC H3A 2B8.

Parking / Transportation

Indoor public parking is available in the Cathedral Place – Tour KPMG Parking Garage (on Union Avenue, south of de Maisonneuve). Parking on Saturday is available at \$7 (cash or credit card only) all day. If you use public transit, the nearest Metro station is McGill.

Meeting of Synod and Registration

Synod will meet <u>in person</u> this year. As a Synod Delegate, you will receive, (sent to the email address indicated in the parish vestry returns), the links necessary for you to register. **Registration prior to Synod is mandatory, therefore we encourage you do it as soon as possilbe.** There is no registration fee for this Synod.

On Tuesday, June 14, 7pm to 7:45pm, a virtual briefing session for new Synod Delegates will take place. You will receive the link to join the session upon registration to synod. In preparation, a document entitled "New Delegate Handbook" is available for download from the diocesan website at <u>www.montreal.anglican.ca/synod</u>.

Agenda

The agenda is available in this Circular. Please note that the Chair will attempt to deal with motions at the times listed in the Agenda, but the debating process may make changes necessary.

Delegate Status

Only delegates and/or substitute delegates whose names were previously submitted to Synod Office may register and vote at Synod.

If both delegate(s) and substitute delegate(s) are unable to serve, the parish must hold another Vestry Meeting to elect a new delegate(s). Please note that Sophie Bertrand (sbertrand@montreal.anglican.ca) must be notified (in advance of Synod) of the date of the Vestry Meeting and given the name(s) and the pertinent information of the new delegate(s) elected. Delegates and/or substitute delegates registered at Synod are the representatives for the entire Synod and may not be replaced at any point during Synod.

Voting Privileges

We draw your attention to point 13 under Section A – Constitution of Synod:

A.13 No delegates shall be allowed to take part in the proceedings of Synod, so long as any assessment payable to the Diocese by the parishes, missions or cures which they represent, for any prior year remains unpaid.

Diocesan Council, at their meeting of September 8, 1998, approved the following interpretation of Section A.13:

The intent of A-13 is to illustrate the seriousness of not paying all assessments, but without excluding congregations from any part of diocesan life. The impediment at Synod would apply only to votes on matters financial. It would apply only to lay delegates (the licensed clergy being present by right). It applies to arrears for the previous year.

La pénalisation au synode ne s'appliquerait qu'aux votes sur des questions financières.

Diocesan Council report 2021

Meeting June 8, 2021

Bishop Mary made the following announcements:

- The Rev. Dr. Heather McCance, is the new Director of Pastoral Studies at the Montreal Diocesan College as of Aug. 1st.
- The Laurentian Regional Ministry (LRM) has recently completed a course of "Theology in the Laurentians" led by the Rev. Prof. Patricia Kirkpatrick and is planning 2 sessions with the Rev. Canon Dr. Judy Paulsen to continue her teaching from Synod.
- The Rev. Dr. Karen Egan has announced her retirement from parish ministry and as chair of the Finance Committee Archdeacon Robert Camara is receiving nominations, either lay or clergy to add as new members.
- The Rev. Tania Lesack is appointed associate priest in the LRM as of September 1.
- The Rev. Canon Joyce Sanchez will be retiring from the hospital in Ste-Annede-Bellevue as chaplain in the Fall
- The Rev. Stephen Petrie and his wife will be moving to PEI to be closer to family.
- The Bishop gave notice of a Diocesan service of Ordination will take place at the Cathedral on Wednesday Sept. 8th at 7pm.
- The Rev. Canon Dr. Lettie James recently celebrated 45 years since her ordination to the Diaconate and Bishop Mary celebrated her 40th year of ordination.

Bishop Mary lifted up the following in prayer:

- The Bishop offered prayers for the recent deaths of the Rev. Deacon Robert Coolidge and Mr. Charles Goddard.
- The Fulford Residence that continues to work on its future.
- The Territory of the People in BC and the discovery of the 215 unmarked graves of former residential school students and against Anti-Indigenous Racism.
- Our Diocesan work against Anti-Black Racism and the work of the committee preparing an important conference in October.

The following motion was passed: Be it resolved that the Finance Committee of the Diocese be relieved of its requirement to instruct the Investment advisors 'to divest from those companies known to be the worst polluters as published in the *Carbon Underground 200*' And instead to support the investment advisors in holding the Anglican Balanced Fund investments up to standards of ESG (Environment, Social

and Governance), which will continue to value sustainable investing and a transition to a low carbon economy.

Rev. Canon Dr. Neil Mancor gave a presentation on donations over the past 18 months of the Pandemic. He noted that there was a significant increase in online giving and encouraged everyone to have the capacity to receive donations online. The Vicar General gave notice that a process of "Dreaming Big" on the use of parochial and diocesan resources will be on the September Agenda and asked Council to think about suggestions for the discussion over the Summer. Council received the Finance Report presented by Mr. Ron O'Connell. Council meeting dates were approved.

Meeting September 14, 2021

Bishop Mary made the following announcements:

- The Bishop noted that because of careful following of our protocols there have been no outbreaks of Covid-19 in any of our congregations but that we will not be able to go back to "the way things were" for a long time.
- After the recent ordinations announced in June, the Bishop appointed The Rev. Ben Stuchbery to be assistant curate in the Parish of Vaudreuil, and The Rev. Fresia Saborio to be Deacon in Charge in St. Georges, Granby and assistant curate in the Regional ministry of Brome-Shefford. The Rev. Susan Searle will continue as assistant curate at St. John the Evangelist in Montreal.
- The Bishop is encouraging clergy and lay leadership to participate in Revive.
- The Fall Clergy Conference is on Zoom this year featuring the Rev. Canon Dr Stephen Fields who is speaking on Preaching in times of change.
- The Bishop is highly encouraging everyone to participate in the Workshop on the Church's role in creating and perpetuating systemic racism in October.
- The Rev. Tapiwa Gusha, who has be the interim priest at St Lawrence church has been appointed as Rector of St Peter's Church in Winnipeg.

The application to do major works by St Joseph of Nazareth to fix their roof, has been approved.

Council received the Finance Report presented by Mr. Ron O'Connell.

The Rev. Dr. Neil Mancor led Council in the National Church's "Surprised by the Spirit" exercise.

Members Forum

- Mrs. Ann Cumyn reminded Council about the PWRDF fundraising appeal that is going from September to next June. The funds raised will support projects projected by Indigenous Communities.
- Ms. Nancy Greene-Grégoire told Council about a rally in support of Universal Basic Income.
- Bishop Mary noted that her bi-weekly compline service on Facebook Live has resumed.

Meeting October 11, 2021

Bishop Mary made the following announcements:

- The Rev. Jean-Jacques Goulet retired October 1st.
- The Rev. Jean-Fils Chéry from Haiti is staying with the Bishop waiting for a visa before he can work as a priest in the Diocese.
- The Rev. Jean Daniel O'Donacada has been appointed half time at St. Hilda's; he also serves as a McGill University Chaplain in St. Martha's Chapel.
- The Parish of St. Simon and St. Bartholomew, formerly in the Archdeaconry of Montreal, has been moved to the Archdeaconry of St. Andrew's since their priest, the Ven. Victor David Mbuyi-Bipungu is Archdeacon of that region.
- The Rev. Nick Brotherwood has been appointed part-time to the Parish of Hemmingford and the Rev. Deacon Ben Crosby, from the Diocese of Massachusetts has been appointed as Curate at Christ Church Cathedral while completing studies at the Diocesan College before he returns to the US for ordination to the Priesthood.
- Bishop Mary encouraged participation in the "Children's Ministry Matters" Event, taking place on Saturday October 16.
- Ms. Sophie Bertrand is on medical leave. Email to her will be forwarded to the Vicar General's office.
- The Bishop will travel to the Territory of the People to attend their Assembly. The area has had a terrible year on many fronts. Bishop Mary asked members to pray for our partners there during this beleaguered time.
- Recently, the Bishop Mary attended an in-person meeting of the House of Bishops.

Bishop Mary invited Ms. Linda Lou Hachey to give a report on Mile End Mission.

The Vicar General gave a COVID update and a review of open parishes.

Council received the Finance Report presented by Mr. Ron O'Connell.

The Bishop asked for feedback on the recent anti-racism workshop. The conversation will continue.

Meeting November 12, 2021

Bishop Mary made the following announcements:

- Due to Covid, Father Linus Buriani from our partner Diocese of Masasi will not be able to begin studies at Dio until September 2022.
- An in-person clergy day was held on November 4.
- The Rev. Joel Amis has been appointed Incumbent at Christ Church Beaurepaire.
- The Bishop has received a letter of resignation from Mr. Richard Matthews, the chair of the Standing Committee on the Stewardship of the Environment.

- The Bishop recently attended a joint meeting of the Boards of the Diocesan Theological College and the United Church Theological College as they continue to explore the strategic alliance partnership.
- Bishop Mary has accepted the resignation of the Rev. Josée Lemoine from the Parish of the Laurentians.
- The Lay Readers Association will be holding a Study Day this coming Saturday in Sutton. The day will include the Commissioning of Lay Readers.
- The Bishop announced the retirement of The Ven. Michelle Eason and the Ven. Jim Bennett.

Ms. Judith Moses and Ms. Janet Marshal from the National Church, gave a presentation on their Strategic Plan.

Council received the Finance Report presented by Mr. Ron O'Connell. Members' Forum

- Ms. Penny Rankin asked members of Council and their networks to participate in a protest outside of Mind Geek against the largest purveyor of online porn and contributing to the abuse of minors.
- The Rev. Jean Daniel O'Donacada will be offering an online workshop on the topic of Pastoral Care for neuro-divergent people.
- Bishop Mary spoke about an online Gathering led by Bishop Bruce Myers looking at Matthew Anderson's new book "Pairings"- Bible Readings & Booze.

No Meeting December, 2021

Meeting January 12, 2022

Bishop Mary made the following announcements:

- 9K from the Bishop's Action Appeal will be used for funding Father Linus Buriani when he arrives next autumn to study at MTDC. His visa is still in process.
- Bishop Mary announced the appointment of the Ven. Sophie Rolland as Archdeacon of St. Laurence and the Rev. Jane Bell has been appointed as Chaplain, two days per week, at Ste. Anne's Military hospital.
- The Bishop recently presented a Bishop's Award to Ms. Carol Johnson of the Parish of Huntingdon. She will present a Bishop's Award to Mr. Chris Haslam at his home and to Mr. Jeff Alexander and Sophie Lanthier during a live-streamed Service at All Saints Two Mountains.
- The Rev. Brian Evans died last week. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.
- The Bishop attended a meeting held in Cowansville on December 2nd to begin discussions on the creation of a new Regional Ministry for the Eastern Townships.
- There will be an online Service marking the Week for Christian Unity on January 23.

Ms. Carolina Manganelli, the new director of Action Réfugiés, gave an update on their work.

The Application to do Major Works by St James Bedford to update the heating of the church and rectory with the funds from a recent sale of a local church was approved. Mr. Stephen Tam presented an update on the year-end financial statements from 2021.

Meeting February 8, 2022

Bishop Mary made the following announcements:

- Bishop Mary informed Council that the decision to hold General Synod this Summer will be made at the March meeting of COGS.
- The Bishop is planning to take a Sabbatical from September to the end of November.
- The Rev. Ben Crosby will be ordained to the priesthood in February in Massachusetts.
- The Rev. Canon Dr. Neil Manor has a regular broadcast on Facebook Live called Pew and Beyond.
- The in-person Clergy silent retreat is planned for March 27-29.

Council received the Finance Report presented by Mr. Ron O'Connell.

Members' Forum:

- Ms. Nancy Greene-Gregoire told Council that a same-sex Iranian couple, sponsored by St Philips and St Thomas, whose refugee status has been accepted is now in Quebec.
- The Dean shared an online event called "Itinerants Speak" and a webinar organized by the Cathedral to honour Black History Month.

Meeting March 8, 2022

Bishop Mary made the following announcements:

- The Bishop lifted up the people of Ukraine and Canadians of Ukrainian descent in prayer as that country is going through unimagined hardship after Russia's invasion.
- General Synod will not meet this year.
- Covid rules are opening up a bit, please see the most recent Covid updates for more information.
- Bishop Jane Alexander, retired bishop of Edmonton, is now interim Bishop in the Territory of People.
- The Rev. Père Emmanuel Duplessis, honorary assistant at St. Hilda's Church, has recently died.
- As part of the National Church's work on dismantling racism, the bishops were asked to send information to the Primate. The Bishop's office sent out a survey with the questions about Black and BIPOC Anglicans in our diocese. Thanks to

all who made the time to answer. The Bishop asked if members knew what percentage of our congregations is BIPOC? It varies from 2% to 98% in our Diocese and there are 24 BIPOC clergy.

- The Bishop has reminded us of the importance of Safe Church practices and the diocese is working on improving our training and updating our policies.
- Bishop Mary has appointed the Rev. Joel Amis as Regional Dean on the recommendation of the clergy of the Deanery of St Anne and Pointe-Claire.
- The Diocesan Staff are able to work in the office again but are also able to choose to continue to work from home.

Members of the Anglican Foundation presented the "Say Yes to Kids! Campaign."

The Anglican Foundation Application brought to Council by Grace Church Sutton to rebuild the church steeple was approved.

The Application to do Major Works by Grace Church Sutton to begin a multi-year plan to redo the roof and steeple was approved.

Council received the Finance Report presented by Mr. Steven Tam.

Council was informed about the opportunity to present up to 5 nominations to Synod and asked to consider names of people who were willing and able to serve.

The Rev. Canon Dr. Neil Mancor presented the Listening Circles that were being offered throughout Lent.

Meeting April 8, 2022

Bishop Mary made the following announcements:

- Bishop Mary announced the appointment of the Rev. Jean-Fils Chéry to the Parish of St. Lawrence.
- The Bishop continues to prepare for Lambeth.
- The Bishop told Council that the National Church Pensions continue to be healthy. The Bishop is offering the book by the Rev. Dr. John Bowen entitled "The Unfolding Gospel" to whoever is committed to reviving their churches.

The Vicar General received names for Diocesan Council nominations to Synod and the vote will be held next meeting.

Mr. Mark Gibson gave a presentation about new project by the Environment Committee to eliminate Greenhouse Gas Emissions caused by heating systems fuelled by fossil fuels.

The application to do major works presented by St Phillip's Montreal West to renovate the Memorial Hall was approved.

Council received the Finance Report presented by Mr. Ron O'Connell.

Mr. Ron O'Connell presented the 2023 Diocesan Budget for any comment by Council.

Member's Forum:

- Ms. Nancy Greene-Gregoire asked Council let people know that there are openings in the EFM course.
- The Bishop told Council that the funeral for Mrs. Mary Fox, a former financial manager at the Diocesan College would be held on April 22.

Meeting May 17, 2022

The Vice-Chair of Council, the Rev. Nick Forte chaired the meeting and Archdeacon Robert Camara made the following announcements on behalf of Bishop Mary who is on holiday:

- The ordination of Ben Stuchbery and Fresia Saborit to the presbyterate is scheduled for June 5th at 4pm.
- The Diocesan Family Day will take place on June 4th at St Phillips Montreal West.
- The funeral for the Rev. Canon Dr. Lettie James was held on May 7th at St George's Place-du-Canada.

Council approved the application for an Anglican Fund Grant by St George's Ste Anne-de-Bellevue to update its community garden.

Council approved the application for an Anglican Fund Grant by St Paul's Greenfield Park to help them "Go Green."

Council received the Finance Report presented by Mr. Ron O'Connell.

Council recommended the 2023 Diocesan Budget to the upcoming Synod.

The Finance Committee has been meeting on Zoom monthly (with occasional exceptions). Our usual business is to review the monthly Diocesan Financial Statements, and to keep an eye on the Arrears Statement. In response to those statements, we agree on any strategy, if necessary, to address concerns. Our mandate is to be a body of oversight for the Diocesan finances, and to support the parishes in maintaining self-sufficiency. In addition, we have heard how progress has

been made in managing the Anglican Funds, although we have no official capacity in this regard.

Late 2021 saw a return to normal collection of Diocesan assessments as parishes reopened and many normal activities began to resume. Diocesan assessments had been lifted near the beginning of the pandemic in order to help parishes weather the adverse effects of shutdowns, restrictions, reduced giving, etc. Such relief to the parishes did, however, mean significant negative impact to the Diocesan budget.

We give thanks for the work of both Mr. Stephen Tam, our Diocesan Controller, and for Mr. Ron O'Connell, the treasurer, who together, ably oversee the financial management of the diocese. We also add a special word of thanks and well-wishes to Ron O'Connell, whose term as Diocesan Treasurer comes to an end with this Synod.

Standing Committee on Human Resources

The Standing Committee on Human Resources met in 2021 and completed a review of the Clergy Handbook, updating many of the sections that required updating. It also reviewed and revised the Wardens' Handbook. Both these handbooks are available online on the diocesan webpage in the following sections: Resources > Clergy Toolbox > Handbooks (www.montreal.anglican.ca).

The Standing Committee on Human Resources also organized a clergy day on Thursday, November 4, 2021 led by the Rev'd Canon Neil Mancor entitled "Embrace the Possibilities: Life and Ministry in a New Era." This was the first in-person gathering for clergy since the beginning of the pandemic and it was a wonderful opportunity for clergy to reconnect in person for a day of prayer, reflection, discussion and fellowship. The day was an opportunity to share our experiences of the pandemic, to date, and to discern possibilities for the future of our communities.

The Standing Committee on Human Resources was chaired by Ms. Ann Cumyn, who completed her term on the committee at the end of 2021. Despite the welcome roll-out of vaccines towards the middle of the Spring of 2021, caution and concerns around Covid-19 impacted activities in parishes across the Diocese. It comes as no surprise then, that the Mission Committee did not receive any applications across year #2 of the pandemic. Thankfully there is evidence of renewed energy and confidence- as our budget going into 2022 has already processed two grants!

The lack of appeals for budget support on 2021 in no way suggests that parishioners and parishes had set aside a gospel driven response to the inequities that covid has so demonstratively pointed to. In fact it is said that giving of funds, comfort and time (where and when allowed) by society in general, has increased notably as people responded to what is to us a familiar narrative: that we are called to be present, to care, to act, and respond to the needs of others and eachother. Restrictions may have limited overt reponses- but our church and churches and the people who gathered in both person and online found ways to uphold the Way.

Visioning our mandate to include raising awareness, an article was submitted to the Montreal Anglican Journal on Canada's responsibilities and obligations under the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC) - timely given Advent and the 30th anniversary of Canada's ratification of the CRC.

Community Ministries

Action Réfugiés Montréal

I. General Developments:

In June 2021, we were hopeful that Covid was well behind us. We had a few months of reprieve and the team began to work from the office on a more regular basis, all while being careful and respecting at least the minimum rules and directives issued by the Quebec health authorities. We took the opportunity to reconnect with each other and work together in person, in addition to celebrating some important milestones and events together. For the new Executive Director ("ED"), this was a wonderful way to get to know the other members of the team. We were obliged to return to working from home in mid-late December, but are back in the office again since March and will be officially in a "return to the office" phase as of April 4th, using a hybrid model.

In August we were saddened to learn about the deteriorating situation in Afghanistan with the return of the Taliban in power. We received many calls and emails from citizens and the media, asking about the situation and what could be done. The ED gave an interview to Radio-Canada expressing the need and our hope for the Quebec government to increase sponsorship of Afghan refugees. Unfortunately, this did not occur. ARM supported Afghan refugees by prioritizing our existing sponsorship applications, and providing information regarding the political and governmental initiatives and ways that people could help, including a dedicated page on our website. Our team also provided extra support to one of our most active members of the Men's' group with his pending refugee claim. We were so relieved his refugee claim was accepted, allowing him to start the process of bringing his wife and children to Canada from Afghanistan.

In late February, we learned of the invasion of Ukraine by Russia. We are again saddened to see the grave deterioration with regards to civilians' safety and we are comforted to see that both the federal and provincial governments are taking steps to expedite and simplify the possibility for Ukrainian citizens to come to Canada on a temporary basis for the moment. We did not receive nearly as many calls or emails and as with the situation in Afghanistan, our mandate allows us to provide help only once the Ukrainians arrive in Canada and as per our existing programs. ARM wishes for a speedy and peaceful end to the hostilities and will provide support if possible.

II. The Team:

In June 2021 the previous ED, Paul Clarke, was onboarding the current ED. After a month or so of learning about the organization, the programs, and the team, the ED concluded that it would be essentially status quo for the short-to medium term (see below re Sponsorship program). The organization, its mission and goals, the funding,

donor relations – all is in excellent health thanks to the wonderful work of Paul. One new development was testing out the possibility of having a dedicated communications officer and, once we witnessed the great added value of that approach, the Ed obtained approval to create a new position for 2022 and we hope to have someone in the role very soon. We also welcomed 2 new team members: Celina Hasbun, parttime detention intervention worker, and Sandra Colon, Sponsorship Program Coordinator, who replaced Cathy Nguyen whom we were sad to see leave ARM.

Our Programs and their Impact

A. Detention Program:

Detention conditions continued to be particularly difficult due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, especially for those in quarantine or separated from their support network. In the reporting period, ARM provided support by phone, as well as weekly trips to the detention center to bring material support to over 200 people. In addition, the team also accompanied and supported many persons after they were released from detention. In November 2021, we released to a few of our partners a study that we did of our detention program. The Report, entitled "Action Réfugiés ne m'a pas laissé seul: Qualitative Study of the Impact of the Immigration Detention Support Program" confirms that, were it not for ARM, those persons would truly be invisible and unheard. The Report will be released to the public in the coming days.

B. Sponsorship Program

Further to the decision taken in 2020 by the Quebec government, we were not able to file any new sponsorship applications in the second half of 2021. In late October, 2021 we learned that applications would be possible for 2022. However, much to our dismay, the number of applications that organizations such as ARM was permitted to submit was reduced from 30 to 20. Furthermore, instead of this number being reserved and guaranteed, our files have been included with all the applications and they are all to be selected according to a draw, a "lottery". As a result, we have no way of knowing how many, if any, of our applications will be accepted for consideration. We nonetheless worked day and night to prepare our 20 files in a very short time frame because our Sponsorship coordinator only started working in December. As of the writing of this report, we still have no news regarding the outcome of the 2022 files. In addition, we have 240 people whose applications are still being processed.

On a positive note, we were happy to welcome 20 sponsored refugeed persons in the reporting period. This number is still significantly lower than in previous years, due mostly to Covid-related delays, and we are hopeful that the 15 persons who are at the final stage of the process and awaiting their travel confirmation will arrive shortly.

C. Twinning Program:

Covid did not stop the twinning program! By June, it was clear that 2021 would be one of the most impactful years for the program. At the end of the year, there were a total

of 47 women participating in the program for the first time, and 8 matches were made in the second half of the year (for a total of 16 matches). In 2022 we have welcomed 4 new participants and have made our first match of the year! The women who participate in this program come from over 9 different countries and multiple cultures and various backgrounds. In addition, our program coordinator managed to keep our promise of holding 1 group activity per month even when that meant that it had to be virtual.

D. Men's' Group

The same can be said for our Men's' group activities – we didn't miss a beat! We alternated between picnics, baseball, watching the Alouettes football game and online conversations on topics such as vaccines and variants, the Federal election and worries about family members overseas. On average, between 7 and 9 refugeed men and asylum seekers participated in these activities.

III. Direct assistance:

ARM provided direct assistance through its operating budget as follows: personal and hygiene products to persons detained at the Immigration Holding Centre; financial assistance with administrative fees related to asylum claims, humanitarian claims, work permit applications, permanent residence applications; financial assistance for living expenses for particularly vulnerable program participants (single mothers).

We were also extremely happy and grateful to have once again received funding from the Montreal Gazette Christmas Fund as well as toys from *Carolyn's Toy Drive* campaign.

IV. Advocacy and Education/Outreach:

Despite the fact that not all activities were back to normal yet, ARM undertook some advocacy and outreach activities. In addition to interviews with the media, ARM continues to be a member of 2 important umbrella organizations – CCR – Canadian Council for Refugees, and TCRI – Table de concertation des organismes au service des personnes réfugiées et immigrantes, including the specialized sponsorship committee ROGPRAQ. In December 2021, Jenny Jeanes, our Program Coordinator who was represented ARM at the CCR for many years and in different capacities, was elected Vice President of the Executive. ARM also continues to work with organizations such as Amnesty International and Human Rights Watch on important issues affecting refugeed persons and asylum seekers.

Our education and outreach activities in the reporting period include: advising and training on the new detention program in BC; a podcast in collaboration with The Refugee Centre; 3 video capsules in collaboration with GoodOwl Center for Justice; moderating a panel discussion during the *Forum sur l'intégration*.

On behalf of all the persons that we support and accompany, the staff, and the Board of Directors – thank you to the Diocese for your continued, crucial support. Together we are sure to obtain justice and compassion for refugeed persons and asylum seekers.

Mile End Community Mission Synod Report: March 2021

30 years of nourishing our community!



2021 marked the 30th anniversary of the Mile End Community Mission, providing care, inspiration and hope to disadvantaged individuals and families in our neighborhood since 1991!



THE MISSION'S AMAZING LEADERSHIP TEAM!

This past year, ten Mission members who serve on our Leadership Team ensured that our community continued to be nourished through our free take-out meals and weekly

Food Bank program.

Dignity is non-judgemental. It's inclusive. It's kind and compassionate. It's respectful. It's love, isn't it? Dealing with roadblocks to health & wellbeing

Given the challenges that poverty alone presents to personal health and wellness, our



community is without doubt, quite vulnerable in the face of the pandemic. Throughout this second year of Covid-19, our **'I Matter'** program continued to find alternate ways to support members with some of their health and wellbeing issues and concerns. For those few members with access to a computer and internet, we were able to hold a few 'I Matter' checkin group sessions using Zoom. For the majority of others, regular telephone outreach was maintained by our staff, a group of McGill University nursing students as part of their Community Health Nursing

project, and through a grassroots chain of telephone support provided by Mission members who offered support to friends in need.

Our newly developed Food Bank delivery service for twenty senior members and those with mobility challenges also provided weekly opportunities for staff and board member Nancy Greene-Gregoire to touch base in person with vulnerable members. Greeting our members daily at our main door also allowed us to stay in touch, particularly with our homeless members.

While the pandemic left us unable to host the McGill Department of Dentistry's biannual Mobile Dental Clinics again this year, members were still able to obtain dental services offered at McGill's dental clinic downtown.

In February, the general public were able to start booking appointments according to age groups for the Covid-19 vaccine. Finally, our members were able to have some protection against the virus that was causing such a whirlwind in our world. However, for many of our members who don't have internet service or telephones, it wasn't possible for them to 'simply register' for a vaccine. This was especially true for our homeless members. As everyone knows, it was quite challenging to get vaccination time slots as they sometimes weren't available anymore by the time you came to the end of the registration process. It was also difficult trying to book appointments that were close enough for our members so that they didn't have to walk too far.

Monitoring the vaccination calendar daily for upcoming availabilities meant a lot of juggling, especially when trying to book, confirm and plan over 40 appointments across all different age groups! Then came the printing out and distributing of members' proof of vaccinations followed by the booking and confirmation of second vaccination appointments.

Given all the stumbling blocks involved in what seems to be a simple process, most of our members would not have received their COVID-19 vaccinations without many layers of help. It was certainly a long process, but we're happy to say that 80% of our vulnerable members have been vaccinated!

In March, the Mission was invited to participate in a Lenten study group that was organized by the Phoenix Community Projects and a small group of other committed people. With countless stories of individual and collective struggles for peace and justice regularly unfolding at the Mile End Mission, our honorary Chaplain, Roslyn Macgregor thought it would be interesting to develop a little video to help portray what dignity means to some of our members. The resulting video was then shown as a point of discussion to participants in the Hope and Promise Lenten study session.

While we've been able to provide health & wellness support to our members on a number of levels this past year, we are very aware of the serious challenges that



heightened loneliness and isolation have presented during the various lockdowns and restrictions. As we look forward to the spring, we know that we'll soon be able to sit together once again on the Mission's Terrace Connie café to enjoy each other's company.

GETTING CLOSER TO THE EDGE

Life on the edge of homelessness has increased greatly due to the continuing rising cost of living and increasingly unaffordable apartments in and around the Mile-End and surrounding areas. With the sad, recent closure of the rooming house across from the Mission due to the owner's retirement and sale of the home, our community is left with

six less local housing options.

While we continue to provide food, a change of clothing, food / restaurant coupons and other supports to our 30+ homeless members, life continued to be so much harder than usual for our friends without homes during the pandemic, especially given the countless closures and restrictions in place.

PROCESSING HOW WE FEEL & REGAINING SOME INNER PEACE

The Mission's community art program continued despite the fatigue and breathlessness that the pandemic makes us live. Adaptation becomes the engine of survival and creation. The majority of the year, the art group was held on Zoom. Last summer, we held our art sessions on the Mission's <*Terrace connie's café*>. **Joanne Racette**

- **14,000** free bags of groceries distributed.
- **7,500** free hot meals were served.
- **6,000+** volunteer hours provided by Mission members on the Leadership Team.
- **175** Christmas baskets distributed.

- Groceries were delivered weekly to 20 seniors and/or people with health/mobility issues.

Words from our Mission's Honorary Chaplain's

Ministry has taken different forms during Covid – but it has always been creative at the Mission, adapting to the needs of the community including staff. This year I supported the staff with phone calls, a special gift bag at Christmas with a thank you for their dedication, love, and commitment to Mission members. I emailed creative liturgies to Mission folks as well as my parish and friends --- with links to other worship opportunities.

In Lent 2021, Mile End members facilitated one of the sessions in a deanery Lent Study online. After zoom discussion, knowing Mission staff are experts in treating people with dignity, we chose the title: Dignity: Christ in me - Christ in you with two questions based on one theme from our baptismal promises:

It has been disappointing not to be able to be more physically involved at the Mission during the pandemic. I look forward to a return to in-person ministry more than supportive phone calls or dropping in for a meal fairly regularly (eat in or take-out) once staff members were vaxed.

St Michael's Mission

L'année 2021 a été marquée par la pandémie de la Covid-19 et a profondémment impacté le milieu communautaire. En effet, de nombreux refuges et organismes ont dû réduire le nombre de services offerts, voire fermer leurs portes, par manque de moyens. Mais la Mission St-Michael a su faire preuve de résilience.

Durant l'année qui s'est écoulée, nous avons rempli le mandat qui nous a été confié, celui d'aider les personnes en situation d'itinérance, aux prises avec des problèmes de toxicomanie, santé mentale, santé physique, ou de judiciarisation. De plus, grâce aux mesures hivernales de la Ville de Montréal, la Mission a pu servir de Halte Chaleur (l'une des seules sur l'île) du 1er Décembre 2021 au 31 Mars 2022, offrant ainsi des services 24h/24 et 7 jours sur 7. Notre équipe a œuvré, de jour comme de nuit, pour faire de la Mission un espace sécuritaire où nos usagers ont pu se réchauffer, se restaurer, et être écouté sans jugement: en 2021, plus de 45 000 repas ont été servis, et 20 000 entre janvier et mars 2022.

Malgré les restrictions sanitaires, nous avons continué de fournir du soutien psychosocial dans une approche humaniste et inclusive, du dépannage alimentaire, des vêtements propres, de l'arrimage vers les ressources adéquates pour mieux répondre aux besoins multiples de notre clientèle. Il est également important de souligner l'engagement de nos bénévoles, qui soutiennent le travail des intervenants, et sans qui notre organisme ne pourrait pas fonctionner au maximum de ses capacités.

Bien que la Halte Chaleur soit terminée, nous continuons d'offrir ces services, et nous servons de refuge transitoire avec les autres centres d'hébergement temporaires.

However, we are proud of our organization's ability to adapt to the ongoing challenges posed by the current health pandemic. Tyndale St-Georges has had an exceptional year where we have navigated the challenges posed by our current health crisis while still delivering meaningful and engaging programs to our members.

Throughout 2020-2021, our Leadership and Management Team were able to analyze the programs that we were offering and strategize how we could do more for our community. Anglican Fellowship of Prayer – Canada

Paper copies can now be provided at no cost by contacting our Resources Coordinator, Paul Dumbrille, at <u>resources@anglicanprayer.org</u>. As in the past, electronic versions can be downloaded at no cost and there are also videos which can be viewed on our website, <u>www.anglicanprayer.org</u>.

We strongly encourage parish prayer leaders to look at these resources. They are well written, insightful and always relevant.

We are well aware that there are many opportunities to pray within your own parish and throughout the Diocese. In fact, we are faithful participants in the All Saints by the Lake Evening Prayer offering. This group continues to pray without ceasing for the needs of our friends and families and those of the local community and the world at large. As we re-open our places of worship, it will be important to reach out to those who may no longer be able to attend in person or have lost interest because their churches have closed. We endeavor to make the seed that is the AFP's Alongsider Program grow to connect these lost souls in prayer for the world, each other and church universal. We pray that some hearts will be stirred to join us and get involved in this most personal of prayer activity.

Council of General Synod

The November meeting of the Council of General was held in the expectation that it would be the start of the preparation for General Synod. However, at present, not everyone is comfortable with joining a large gathering in person. So, there will be no General Synod this summer. The next two general Synods will be held in summer 2023 and summer 2025. Although CoGS appears to have only two main meetings a year, three or four days in the spring and in the fall, the work continues year round. In spite of Covid-19, we can truly say: "Glory to GOD who is able to do far more than we can ask or imagine". In November CoGS moved from a zoom meeting to a hybrid meeting. This enabled most members to attend in the manner best suited to their health needs.

The Strategic Planning Working Group (SPWG) continues to be forward looking. While we really do not know what the future will bring, the SPWG focused on meeting with Anglicans across the country, grouped by their contribution i.e. organists, secretaries, bishops....these groups were asked to share their aspirations and how they might be realised, Members of the SPWG visited our Diocesan Council at its November meeting.

Rescheduling General Synod has gifted this group with another year to learn the hopes and concerns of all those associated with the ACC. The presentation by the SPWG and subsequent discussion was followed by Neil Eliot's forecast of the Anglican Church disappearing in 40 year's time!

The marginalisation of those who look different and who have customs that are different has been a regular trait of human kind. Our Primate has put a particular focus on this subject. A Dismantalisation of Racism Task Force has been established and we learned of the experience of some of its members as they were growing up. Some of these experiences still continue today.

There is always something to learn about the indigenous people. The more we know the richer we become. We were privileged to watch the 30 minute video, "Reclaiming Our Spiritual Wholeness: Our Journey to Self-Determination"

Anglican Balanced Funds Ronald O'Connell

For the year-ended Dec. 31, 2021

The Board of Trustees completed a very busy year selecting a new investment manager for the fund and significantly revising The Investment Objectives and Policy Statement.

The new investment manager is Manulife Private Wealth who began in October 2021 replacing Letko, Brosseau & Associates who had managed our investments since March 2004. As we reported to Synod last year, the returns for the previous three years had been substantially below market prompting a search for a new manager. With Manulife we get best in class managers for each of the asset classes for example Bonds, Stocks and Private Real Assets. The asset class managers are selected for their outstanding performance as well as their commitment to ESG (environmental, social and corporate governance) issues.

The unit value of the shares in the fund grew from \$34.77 to \$37.78 or 8.66% after a distribution of 4% to the unit holders.

Concerning ESG, the following is taken from the new policy statement:

The Board of Trustees believes that environmental, social and corporate governance (ESG) issues can affect the performance of investment portfolios (to varying degrees across companies, sectors, regions, asset classes and through time). Further, the Board of Trustees believes that engaging with investee companies and voting proxies thoughtfully is the underpinning to a well-managed approach to sustainable investing. Active ownership can contribute to the long-term sustainability of investee companies while improving the sustainability of their business models and reducing risk. The Fund is also committed to being a leader in all aspects of a transition of a low carbon economy.

In line with this belief, sustainable investing is addressed in the following ways: Investment Managers must ascribe to the UN Principles of Responsible Investing and demonstrate continued progress on embedding ESG factors into their investment policies, risk management procedures, research and analysis, portfolio construction and stewardship approaches. The Fund Manager will undertake to monitor the investment managers' portfolios in the context of ESG factors at least on an annual basis. In addition, the Fund Manager will consider ESG capabilities when hiring new investment managers and will assess: 1) their ability to integrate ESG factors into their investment process and 2) their progress towards embedding ESG factors into their investment policies, risk management procedures, research and analysis, portfolio construction and stewardship approaches. The Fund Manager will monitor developments in this area and review ESG considerations in the policy annually.

Anglican Spiritual Direction Group

This is the report of the Anglican Spiritual Directors Group to Synod for the year 2021.

The Anglican Spiritual Direction Group is composed of seventeen members. Nine members are laity, and eight members are clergy. Our purpose is to further the development of spiritual direction among ourselves and within the Diocese.

During the first half of the year, we met regularly every six weeks by Zoom when we opened in prayer and meditation followed by a business meeting where we shared news of upcoming spiritual direction events, reports of events attended by our members and recommendations of new books and publications all to continue our on-going formation.

We began the second half of 2021 with a wonderful day of retreat meditating with clay based on "Memento Mori: Payers on the Last Things" led by Rev. Holly Radcliff at River Cross Farm, home of Sally Harrington-Philippo.

We did not meet again as a group in 2021 due to difficulties brought on by the pandemic. However, it was a time when we were active as spiritual directors, supporting our directees in this challenging time.

Most of the spiritual directors are directed themselves by spiritual directors. They met a total of sixty-seven people, most of whom were directed at regular intervals for ongoing spiritual direction, others directed on silent retreats, others matched with spiritual directors for on-going spiritual direction. Not counted here are the number of people we met as spiritual directors in the "Revive" program with the Rev. Dr. Neil Mancor.

We value ongoing formation to improve our knowledge of this vocation. During the pandemic in 2021 most of our formation events occurred via webinars using Zoom technology. A variety of sixteen webinars and several on-line retreats were attended or led by some of the members. Some of those webinars were: "Exploring Shame from Unhealthy Images of God, Self and Others" By Don Bisson SJ, OIS; "Living with Hope: Overcoming Spiritual Discouragement" by Tim Gallagher, OVM; "Seeing Everything New in Christ" by Damian Zynda, ThD, OIS; "The Nature of Grace in the Conversion Process of the Spiritual Exercises" by Damian Zynda, ThD, OIS; "Accepting My Neighbour: Culture and Spiritual Direction", by the Church of St. Peter Upon the Water; "Discerning the Will of God" by Tim Gallagher, OVM; "Teaching the Rules of Discernment" by Tim Gallagher, OVM; "Making Spiritual Direction Ignatian" by Joseph Tetlow, SJ; and "Archbishop of Canterbury's *Thy Kingdom Come"*, daily prayer for ten days between Ascension and Pentecost, with an added Montreal focus: "Ten Days of Prayer for the Renewal of the Diocese," by Rev. Dr. Neil Mancor.

We also took part in on-line courses from Montreal Diocesan College such as: "Anglican Origins" by Dr. Hilary Bogert-Winkler; "Wholeness and Holiness: Reconciliation in the Church" by Rev. Dr. Jesse Zinc; "Creation: Christian Scripture and Creation", by Rev. Dr. Jesse Zinc; "Gospel of Luke" by Rev. Dr. Jesse Zinc.

Other courses were: "Antiracism Workshop": Anglican Diocese of Montreal, Dr. Myrna Lashley; and "Delivered Out of Empire" from Laurentian Regional Ministry, by Rev. Dr. Patricia Kirkpatrick. The on-line retreats were organized by the Ignatian Spirituality Center in Montreal at Villa St. Martin (Jesuit) in Pierrefonds, QC.

We continued to give leadership in spiritual direction because we value our own ongoing formation. We led retreats and gave workshops on-line. We supervised spiritual directors, and we matched people with spiritual directors. Some of us worked with the Rev. Dr. Neil Mancor to help lead the "Revive" program in Montreal, on the West Island, the South Shore and the Eastern Townships. A few of us have led a prayer and meditation time on Holy Saturday and Advent Quiet Day. Some of the laity are lay readers who also have preached and taught at intervals; such as A Talk on "The Examen Prayer" at Christ Church Cathedral; and Leading "Contemplative Prayer" for a parish on-line, or offering sermons in one's church We even have a few who have organized retreats in the past and recently a webinar with Tim Gallagher, OMV such as "Living with Hope"; and "Memento Mori: Prayers on the Last Things" a six week Lenten activity at St. George's Church, Place du Canada.

We value reading professional books to promote new understandings of spiritual direction. A variety of twenty books were read by many of us. Some titles were: "Spiritual Directors International" monthly magazine, Connecticut, USA; "Making Choices in Christ" by Joseph Tetlow SJ; "The Discernment of Spirits" by Timothy Gallagher, OVM; in "Draw Me Into Your Friendship: The Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius" by Fleming SJ; "Prayer Companion Handbook" by John Wickham, SJ; "Compassioning: Listening Skills" from The Ignatian Spirituality Center of Montreal; "The Discernment of God's Will" by Timothy Gallagher, OVM; "Philokalia" by Church Fathers, Teaching on Spiritual Life and Prayer; "Contemplative Retreat" by Franz Jalics, SJ; "God I Have Issues" by Marc Thibodeau, SJ; "Setting the Captives Free" by Timothy Gallagher, OVM; "Teaching Discernment" by Timothy Gallagher, OVM; "Candlelight, the Art of Spiritual Direction" by Susan Phillips; "The Critical Journey: Stages in the Life of Faith" by J. Hagberg, and R. Guelich; "Momento Mori: Prayers on the Last Things"; "Understanding the Spiritual Exercises" by Michael Ivens, SJ; "Unsettling the Word: Biblical Experiments in Decolonization" edited by Steve Heinrichs, Common Word; and "Boundless Compassion", "Boundless Compassion Journal" and "Prayers of Boundless Compassion" by Joyce Rupp. We offer this list that you might find something that interests you for your prayer time. Finally, the total amount of money spent by members of the group on webinars, retreats and books was in excess of \$1000.

Anti-Racism Task Force

In May of 2020, when the pandemic was proliferating and consuming the world, and no one had any idea how long it would last or what it would mean, George Floyd was murdered. The Black Lives Matter movement, which was already blossoming into an historically important global phenomenon, exploded, and people of good will from all walks of life were suddenly protesting and demanding change despite the dangers of the pandemic. Discussions about what to do, and how the world needs to change, were popping up in every sphere of human life. And the church did not remain untouched. Many asked, What does this movement mean for the church? How does the moral and spiritual demand to be an anti-racist affect the followers of Jesus Christ? In what ways do we review our own history and complicity in the slave trade, and in maintaining the status quo through the centuries, in the light of what is being written and said by champions of racial justice? What changes need to be made? We had a choice between burying our heads in the sand and getting busy. With the support of Bishop Mary and Synod, the Anti-Racism Task Force was formed to help navigate these questions and form a course of action. The task force began by simply getting the word out, encouraging discussions, and going on what amounted to a listening tour. A survey was sent out to figure out where were were as a diocese and what the various churches were thinking and doing. This alone got people talking and, even better, listening more. Many congregations in the diocese had already begun reading books on the subject and having in-depth talks about the role race has played in our collective history. Once the task force was formed, people requested additional information and more resources, a hopeful sign. We did our best to answer that need, as well as all the questions being posed, to the best of our ability. Conversations, and even some debates, continued to flow. The question, How do we together become workers for racial justice?, began to cement itself in the collective mind in the diocese of Montreal.

Around that time, the Most Reverend Linda Nicholls invited our co-chair, Dion Lewis, to speak at the Council of General Synod on the topic of Dismantling Racism. His wise words, based on a lifetime of experience and devotion to the church, left an impression that continues to reverberate for all of us and light the way forward.

Our first diocese-wide event was an in-depth, two-part workshop in October led by Dr. Myrna Lashley, Associate Professor of Psychiatry at McGill University. An expert in conducting workshops on race and human relations, and in inspiring people to think in new ways, her awards include The Martin Luther King Legacy Award, the Merit Award for the Kahnawake Native Survival School, and the Simon Wiesenthal Award for Holocaust Studies. Dr. Lashley (who insists on being called Myrna) opened the eyes of many of the participants to the prevalence of racist ideas and images in our daily lives, and to the impact they have upon our BIPOC brothers and sisters. While the focus was on anti-Black racism, Myrna was the perfect person to build bridges and show that all forms of racism are connected through the legacy of colonialism and White supremacy. Her expertise was matched by her kindness and compassion for all involved. She kept asking, "Is everyone OK?" She exuded warmth. And there were many who remarked upon that with gratitude.

The feedback for that event was overall quite positive. And the good suggestions that some gave are still being processed for our event in the coming fall. There were a few participants who felt they hadn't much to learn, and that probably reveals how far we as a community still have to go.

In the months that followed, task force members were involved in helping to mount the Black Heritage Celebration this past February. Dion Lewis delivered a sermon that inspired, challenged, and pointed toward communal healing. There were invited guests, breathtakingly talented musicians, celebrated poets, moving prayers from children, and a completely beautiful vibe of gratitude and celebration despite the necessity of meeting on zoom.

Because of the constraints of zoom, and to make up for it, we are hoping to put on an additional event in the summer to celebrate diversity in the diocese with a live, inperson, outdoor event that promises food, music, and laughter, bringing everyone together in a way that will be truly joyful. Meanwhile, the Montreal Diocesan Theological College and United Theological College have invited Adele Halliday, the Anti-racism and Equity Officer for the United Church of Canada, to be the speaker at their convocation in early May. Dr. Jesse Zink reached out to the task force so that together we can help facilitate a compelling event on the afternoon of the convocation. This is good news, because the United Church has led the way in many respects on working toward becoming an anti-racist church, and we in the task force have learned much from attending their workshops and experiencing how they do things. Anti-racism training is mandatory and ongoing in the United Church, and we hope to encourage the Anglican Church as a whole to follow suit. We have much we can learn from them.

Progress in work such as ours is hard to measure. In the past year, we have come far and done much, but it is the beginning of a beginning, and there is still much work to do. But a tide seems to have turned, and there is a momentum brewing that will be impossible to undo. We want to bring people together to celebrate and share our joy in the Lord, and we want to balance that with the necessary work of bringing change and planning the next workshop for the fall, which will involve some discussion of search committees and how to improve them.

Thanks to all who have supported us with kindness and prayers, and those who have shared ideas and concerns. Don't forget to follow our Facebook page, Anglicans for Racial Justice and Equity. Our doors and our ears are always open. Let us know how we can serve.

Archives

In 2021 the archives received and handled 23 requests for historical and property related research and 79 requests for certificates or research in genealogy; this number includes requests for copies of extracts requested by the *Direction de l'état civil*. Total payments to archives amounted to \$1,047 (this sum does not account for exchange rates resulting from US dollar transactions).

Several financial and legal property related documents were archived in 2021 as follows:

deed of sale for La Nativité, 10374 De Cobourg; deed of sale for St. Paul, Philipsburg; deed of donation and separate agreement between the Parish of Stanbridge East and the Municipality of Frelighsburg for the sale of Bishop Stewart Memorial Church (Holy Trinity), in Frelighsburg; deed of sale for St. Mary's, Kirkland; deed of donation of a parcel of land related to Holy Trinity, Ste-Agathe; deed of sale for All Saints, Abercorn; deed of sale for a property related to St. John the Evangelist, Stanbury; deed of sale for St. Mark's, Longueuil; deed of sale for St. James the Less, Pigeon Hill.

Tony Blunt brought a set of files related to the Anglican Funds managed by his father, the Rev. David Blunt, during his service at St. Matthew's, Hampstead. The fonds

include clergy pension fund documentation, historical material, slides of stained-glass church artefacts, metal memorial plaques, and some accounting material.

The Diocese of Montreal being the repository of archival fonds for the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, certificates of consecration and installation were forwarded to the archives for: Bishop Dr. Geoffrey Curtis Ralph Peddle of the Diocese of Eastern Newfoundland and Labrador; Bishop John Organ of the Diocese of Western Newfoundland; Bishop Samuel Vincent Rose of Eastern Newfoundland and Labrador.

Framed photos with brass plaque identifiers depicting all the Bishops of the Diocese of Montreal were accessed upon the closure of the Fulford Residence Church Home. They now grace a main hallway of the Synod offices. Of that collection, the photo of Bishop Mary Catherine Irwin-Gibson was the inspiration for the completion of an oil painting portrait of the bishop painted by Assistant Archivist Sandra Koukou. Also, from the Church Home came a brass bookstand for the altar and a substantial collection of silver religious artefacts that were used for prayer service. Around thirtyfour boxes containing nursing medical records, bills paid, and payroll and bank records also were accessed, all of which are destined for shredding at the 7-year cut-off fiscal period designated for all accounting documents throughout the Province of Quebec.

Some artefacts received by the archives include a book owned by Hubert Coffin signed and dated 1910 inside entitled "History of the Diocese of Montreal 1850-1910 penned by the Rev. J. Douglas Borthwick. It was mailed to the diocese by Gordon H. Lummis of Nova Scotia. Dawn Sparling, a clergy widow called in January of 2021 to notify the archives that she retains two candlesticks from St. Paul, Philipsburg after the sale of the church. From The Venerable Peter Hannen were accessed the Grant Family Succession of the Barons of Longueil prepared for the South Shore Protestant Regional School Board by Thomas Wylie, dated August 1981. This accession was filed with St. Mark's, Longueuil fonds. A large brass plaque dated 01 November 1920 also accessed in 2021, describes a sanctuary window dedicated by his spouse to commemorate the memory of Charles Colmore Grant, 7th Baron of Longueuil.

Five boxes of prayer books were delivered from Holy Trinity, Ste-Agathe. Nine Liturgy and prayer books of good quality binding were accessed from Kenneth Wallace. Dean Bertrand Olivier of Christ Church Cathedral forwarded two photos found online from the archives of the Ville de Montréal, one of them depicting CCC in the rain dated 1916, and the other a photo of the cathedral at a street crossing dated 1963. Two sepia photos of St. Hilda's Anglican Church at its inception were emailed by Bishop Mary, one depicting the interior and the other the exterior of the church. One photo of the interior of St. Columba, N.D.G. and one of the interior of St.-Saviour's, Upper Lachine were accessed from The Venerable Peter Hannen.

Unaudited financial statements for Montreal Diocesan Theological College for the year ended April 30, 2020, were submitted by Diocesan Financial Assistant, Jennifer James-Phillips.

Various church fonds related to accounting, property, vestry meetings, Women's Auxiliary, Anglican Church Women and varia were accessed from: St. John the Divine,

The Glen; Church of The Redeemer, Weir; St. Georges, Rockaway; Church of the Good Shepherd, Laurel; and St. Francis of the Birds, St. Sauveur. From St. Mark's, Longueuil came a white alb, historical documents and plaques, confirmation lists, wills and various other documents, a mallet and base for calling meetings to order, a children's bible story book, histories including a history of slavery in Longueuil, a large pen and ink drawing of St. Mark's, several key chains with a picture of the church attached. From CHL (St. Cuthbert, St. Hilda and St. Luke) was accessed a Book of History of St. Luke's, Rosemount for their anniversary at CHL. A photo postcard of St. George's, Granby dated 1908 was emailed to archives by Jim Henderson.

A woman whose one family member was baptized at the Christ Church Cathedral of Montreal and whose ancestry is from the famed Taschereau family, brought a delicate selection of infant baptismal laced linens (washed and refurbished by Sandra Koukou) along with an heirloom photo, all of which were added to the museum collection. On another side, an anonymous donator left a ceramic crèche in excellent condition that was added to the museum collection.

The Diocesan Archives continue to benefit from the gracious assistance and support of our dedicated volunteer, Peggy Simpson. And finally, I would like to thank Sandra Koukou for all her hard work and dedication. The Archives could not function without her.

Audit Committee

The members of the Audit Committee are presently James Pratt, Nicholas Forte, Michael Hiles and Michael Patry. The mandate of the Committee is to oversee the audit functions of the Synod and to make policy recommendations on any matter affecting audit, financial reporting or compliance.

The Committee reviewed and accepted the Auditors' plan for the audit of the Diocese's 2021 financial statements. Upon completion of the audit, the Committee met with the Auditors, the Honorary Treasurer and the Manager of Financial Services by way of zoom meeting to discuss the audit and to review the draft 2021 audited financial statements of the Diocese. The Committee was satisfied with its review.

It is also the responsibility of the Audit Committee to review, amongst other, the written representations of the auditors, the Diocese's internal controls, the audit fees and compliance with regulatory requirements. These were reviewed and approved.

Once again the year's audit process went smoothly, reflecting the very good working relationship between the Diocese's accounting staff and the Auditors. This resulted in the maintenance of the fee structure at reasonable levels and timely production of the financial statements.

The Audit Committee would like once more to express its appreciation to all concerned for the way in which the audit was carefully carried out. Special thanks go to Ron O'Connell, our Honorary Treasurer, to Stephen Tam, our Manager of Financial Services and to Jennifer James - Phillips, our Assistant Controller for making sure the audit was properly managed. The Committee wishes also to extend additional thanks to Ron O'Connell for the excellent work he has provided the Diocese as its Treasurer, this being the last Audit Review the Committee will be conducting with Ron as Treasurer.

Crosstalk Ministries

2021 was another challenging year for Crosstalk Ministries. The pandemic continued to deny us the opportunity to gather together in the summer months in any viable fashion. Our main ministries (Day Camps (pre-Kindergarten-grade 6), Junior Camp (ages 8-12) and Senior Camp (ages 13-18)) were postponed once again.

This has taken its toll on us financially. We eagerly anticipate the days when we can meet again. We look forward to offering young people an opportunity to engage in Spirit-led fellowship, learning and fun. At the time of writing, things are looking up for summer 2022.

In the meantime, the Board of Directors for our organisation have done their level best to maintain visibility, fellowship and interest. We continue to distribute our newsletter, NetWorks. Our Website received 387 visits in the month of October alone. Day of Campers/alumni and their families across Canada were invited to the Day Camp Cook-Along Course, were alumni shared their favourite Lenten and Easter recipe traditions, teaching us how to prepare them. Staff of the different ministries attempted a number of virtual gatherings, providing an opportunity for worship, praise, planning and encouragement. The Day Camps committee started to put together a series of videos covering key aspects of children's ministry (e.g. interpersonal skills, accessibility, music ministry) in the hopes of building up a library for purchase by communities. They also began work on an e-book project entitled 'Come Together', a manual for communities who want to explore regular All Ages worship gatherings to celebrate feasts and festivals of the liturgical year. In December, Ms. Valerie Taylor, our Day Camps Director, organised an increasingly popular gathering known as 'Carols and Cocoa'. I believe the title is self-explanatory.

People are still supporting us financially. The hits on our website show that people are still interested in what we are doing and planning to do. We press on.

Congregational Development and Post-Ordination Training *Neil Mancor*

Congregational Development Report

This report has something of a "then" followed by a "now". "Then" was during the continued lockdown which closed our churches and kept us largely confined to relating to each other through electronic means. "Now" is the time we are in during which something approaching normal life has returned. With this comes a different focus on our activities.

Over the past year, as our churches largely remained closed, much of our work focused on electronic means of communication. To this end, we continued to be active with our Revive groups all over the Diocese. We had four groups based geographically in the West Island, NDG, South Shore and Eastern Townships. I am very grateful to the spiritual directors who so faithfully led us in prayer and meditation each week. I also would like to acknowledge the leaders who, working in collaboration with me and with one another, increasingly took on the up-front work of leading these groups. And I am grateful beyond words to all the participants who came week after week and shared so much of themselves. We pioneered in-person Revive events (even squeezing one in in Advent just before Omicron asserted itself and closed us back down). Personally, I have been very blessed by being able to participate in all of these groups and to get to know so many wonderful people in a much deeper way. Our Revive ministry has extended itself all the way to British Columbia as we now have a group amongst members of our partner diocese the Territory of the People. The Revive course is planned to return in the Fall of 2022 under the aegis of the Lay Readers but open to all.

The growth of the Revive course is a testament to the initiative of many from our Diocese who chose to use the lockdown in a productive way. In doing so we made something beautiful out of a difficult situation. Revive is all about spiritual formation, vitality and life. It is my conviction, and that of many who study parish vitality and flourishing, that for a faith community to flourish in the healthiest sense of that word, it is imperative that prayer, Bible study and sharing lie at the center of our common life. This does not mean that everyone in a church needs to participate in that kind of thing. But someone does. Revive points us to the tools that are there for this kind of sharing, but there are many other similar resources that you can use. Always feel free to ask me if you would like to find out more.

"Now" we are in a different time. Our churches have reopened and many of us have returned to work. All of us on the Synod staff have adapted to a new pattern of coming into the office three days per week. And more activities are returning to our churches, though we are still being careful about how we gather, and probably will continue to do so for some time. Perhaps the days of parish dinners have not yet returned. Nonetheless, the sense of re-opening after a two-year pause has left the leadership of

our Diocese with many questions about how the Church will continue to exist and flourish in a very changed environment. To answer these questions, we commissioned a series of studies of our geographical Diocese from Environics Analytics. These studies give us a wealth of information about the people who live all around our churches: their family structure, income levels, ethnicity, religious affiliation and lifestyles. All of this is meant to help us take a look at the opportunities that lie all around us for our mission. I can tell you that there is an immense amount of potential mission to be grasped, if we are willing to rise to the challenge. For just as a flourishing church needs an internal spiritual vitality, so too it requires a focus on mission that makes a difference to the people who live in about a 1 km radius around the church. It really is that simple. We are more than happy to come to talk to you more about the possible directions the statistics can give to your community of faith. The world has changed over COVID, there have been shifts in lifestyle, work habits and attitudes. And we know what they are and how we can speak into them as communities of faith. In this work, I am particularly grateful to Canon David Robinson, retired from the Diocese of Toronto for so generously giving of his time to work with Environics to prepare these reports and even more time to helping us interpret them. These reports are available for all to use and I would be thrilled to be able to come and discuss them with you.

The work we could not continue without much support. I am grateful to all my colleagues on our Diocesan staff for their partnership in our work. I thank Bishop Mary for her leadership of us all. And I particularly wish to thank our Vicar General, Archdeacon Robert Camara who devotedly oversees us all with immense devotion and care.

Above all, I want to thank YOU, the people of the Diocese of Montreal. Your energy and willingness to try new things is surely a sign of great hope to us all.

Post Ordination Report

The Post-Ordination programme in the Diocese of Montreal is intended to support the newly ordained in their first two years of ministry. We meet monthly to discuss diverse topics of importance to those beginning their ministerial life. Although we have a small group this cycle, our members are very devoted and we continue to gather. I am thankful to all our presenters who have shared their time and wisdom with us.

Education for Ministry (EFM)

The Education for Ministry (EfM) course provides the opportunity for participants to ground themselves in our Christian tradition through study, prayer and discussion. The course content is spread over four years, with students only needing to commit to one year at a time. First year is the Hebrew Bible or Old Testament, followed by the New Testament in second year. Year three is the History of Christianity and in the last year

we read recent writings in Theology, Ethics and Interfaith relations. A group can have students in all four years.

The Diocese of Montreal has three EfM groups, one at at Grace Church in Sutton in the Eastern Townships, one at the Montreal Diocesan Theological College, or Dio as we call it, one, and one at St. Simeon's in Lachute.

The EfM group in Sutton started to meet in person last Fall, then went online after the Christmas holidays. There are 7 in the group with Kate Murray graduating from EfM this spring. People remained enthusiastic while working their way through the readings and learning how to do Theological Reflection together.

Both the EfM group that meets at Montreal Dio on the McGill campus and the EfM group from Lachute moved online last March 2020 and have remained that way since. We hope to start meeting in person in the Fall of 2022, but will still keep online participation as an option. Why go out on cold nights when you can join the class from your own home? We will have 3 grads from the Dio group this spring: Orpha Adams, Florence Collins and Dion Lewis.

We held an online EfM mentor training session in August 2021, with Annette Cowan as our trainer, and we were joined by a mentor from Calgary. It was intense and very insightful as always, and we learned a lot. Any priest, deacon, or EfM 4th year student or grad is welcome to take the mentor training. The next one will likely be in late August again. Just get in touch with me (details below).

Montreal Diocesan Theological College

Jesse Zink

It has been a challenging year at the college as we have adapted to in-person learning during a global pandemic. Many of our usual assumptions about what we can do have been upended. Still, in the midst of all of this, we have made significant progress on several goals. Underlying all of our work is immense joy and gratitude for the continued privilege of serving God and God's church in this place and at this time.

In the spring and summer of 2021, the United Theological College moved into our building, following the sale of their building just up the street from us. It was not so much a case of "welcome" as "welcome back!" This is the third time that UTC has shared space in Dio's building. (During World War II, the military took over UTC's building then at the corner of University and Milton and during the 1960s and 1970s, the two colleges again shared space.) This time the move was part of a broader strategic alliance between our two colleges. Principal Jesse Zink has been acting as principal of both colleges for the past year, we have been cooperating on programming, and we have been actively exploring what a sustainable, shared future would look like. This last task has been overseen by a small working group of representatives from the two Boards of Governors and been ably assisted by an external consultant and several task-specific working groups. That process has led to the outlines of an agreement that would continue a distinctive United Church theological education program within the college on an ongoing basis. Those agreements still need to be reviewed and approved by the two Boards of Governors, which will take place after this report is submitted but before diocesan synod. Watch the Anglican Montreal and social media for the latest news!

The other major development in the life of the college this year was the awarding of \$1-million (US) 5-year grant from the Lilly Endowment Pathways for Tomorrow initiative to the Montreal School of Theology, the consortium of which we are a part. This was an immensely competitive process among theological schools in the U.S. and Canada and we are delighted that MST is among 10 Canadian schools that have received such a grant. Over the next five years, these funds will allow us to re-launch our summer internship program for young people, conduct a comprehensive overhaul of our field education program, and launch a post-graduation mentoring program for newly ordained clergy. It is an exciting and, yes, slightly daunting prospect.

The college is taking a leadership role in offering the summer internship program, called the Montreal Mission Internship. In April, we admitted 12 young people to this program from a range of denominational backgrounds and from all across the country. They'll spend nine weeks in Montreal this summer engaging in community building,

vocational reflection, and service learning in this city. We had so many applicants that we had to create a waiting list. Pending receipt of more funding, we hope to be able to expand the size of the program. We have hired a new program director who is overseeing this work this summer. We're excited to be able to work with such a diverse group of young people of faith this summer.

This is now the fourth year that we've offered online open enrollment courses. These courses are designed to make accessible theological learning to individuals and congregations. Many churches in this diocese (and many others) have used these courses as adult education in their churches. We offered courses this year on the Gospel of Luke, the Acts of the Apostles, Scripture and Climate Change, and more. We also offered courses for individuals on preaching and pastoral care. All these courses were well subscribed and we look forward to continuing to develop this model in coming years. We want to be sure that the resources and learning we have at the college can enrich the entire church.

The college benefits from the work that UTC has done in offering educational programs in French. This year, several Anglicans enrolled in online courses in French and we hope to see this number expand in the future. In addition, we anticipate relaunching in the coming year a Certificate in Bilingual Ministry. This is designed both for our degree students but is also meant for clergy and lay people who wish to focus in an intentional fashion on the French-language skills necessary for ministry in the French language in Quebec. This will be an excellent continuing education opportunity for clergy in this diocese. Stay tuned for details.

In the midst of all this work, we continue to have a diverse group of students who are studying on our degree programs and preparing for ministry. The years of the pandemic have somewhat curtailed the rate of growth in our enrollment but we have a vital core of people who are called to ministry and passionate about preaching the gospel in the world. It has been a tremendous joy to see how our students from Anglican, United, and other backgrounds have come together in a single college community this year marked by generosity and goodwill. We give great thanks to God for the vocation of these students and the gifts they bring to ministry.

We also give thanks to God for the tremendous support that so many donors continue to offer the college, particularly during a time of global pandemic. In the fiscal year that is just ending, we anticipate setting a new record for donations to the college. We continue to have long-term fiscal challenges to bear in mind and we continue to take concrete steps to address these. But it is the support of so many donors, both in the Diocese of Montreal and beyond, that gives us the hope and confidence to continue in this ministry.

Partnerships Committee

Membership in the committee consists of Revd. Andy O'Donnell (Chair), Ven. Michael Robson, Archdeacon Victor David Mbuyi Bipungu, Revd. Grace Burson, Ven. Ralph Leavitt, Revd. Tyson Rosberg, Mrs. Sue Winn, Mrs. Valerie Delacretaz, Mrs. Beth Reed, Mrs. Angela Andrews and Mr. Raymond Noël. Bishop Mary and the Vicar-General and Executive Archdeacon Robert Camara are ex-officio members.

Because of COVID-19 restrictions, all of our meetings were held electronically using Zoom. On several of these meetings we were graced by the presence of Bishop Mary.

This committee oversees all aspects of relationships with dioceses in Canada and around the world. We continue a longtime relationship with the Territory of the People in British Columbia, and an ongoing partnership with the Diocese of Masasi in Southern Tanzania. We are also exploring a conversation with the Diocese of Kinshasa in the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

In addition to these formal partnerships, the committee works closely with PWRDF and the Companions of the Diocese of Jerusalem.

Territory of the People held its Annual Assembly on October 16th, which was attended in person by Bishop Mary and by committee members on Zoom. It is having difficulty finding a bishop to replace Bishop Barbara Andrews as she moves into her wellearned retirement. Frequent meetings were held with them using zoom to bring us together with their committee, chaired by the Rev. Isabel Healy-Morrow. As a result of these joint meetings, the committees were able to introduce the parish of All Saints by the Lake in Dorval with a parish in the territory who are exploring the possibility of a partnership at the parish level. Progress on that parish-level partnership, and on our partnership with the Territory has been hampered by major floods and wildfires in the Territory.

The major effort of the committee during the year was addressing the administrative and COVID-related issues that arose in supporting a student from Masasi to attend the Montreal Diocesan Theological College. The candidate for studies in Montreal is the Rev. Linus Buriani, a priest who is well known by a number of members of our committee. Following his studies, he would return to teach at St. Cyprian's Theological College. The Diocese of Masasi has plans for St. Cyprian's to become a regional centre for theological training. Father Linus has strong English skills. Everything is moving slowly because of the pandemic.

Questions remain about the program Father Linus would pursue, the timing of his entry to classes (currently delayed until September 2022), his access to adequate internet connection. Accommodations will be needed in Montreal, and funds must be raised to cover his costs for two years of study (spread over three fiscal years for our diocese). Funding to support Fr Linus was included in this year's Bishop's Action Appeal; we are grateful to Bishop Mary, and to all who contributed to this ministry,

(note that it's not too late for those who still wish to do so).

At this time, we are still sharing experiences and mutual prayer with the Diocese of Kinshasa. We would like to continue in partnership with this French-speaking African diocese. The Kinshasa diocese was where Archdeacon Victor-David used to live. Bishop Mary met the bishop of Kinshasa, the Right Reverend Achille Mitshundu, during a course for new bishops in Canterbury.

The objectives of the committee for 2022 are to continue coordination with and the fostering of the existing partnerships as well as to support the attendance at the Montreal Diocesan Theological college of the divinity student from Masasi.

Primate's World Relief and Development Fund (PWRDF)

What a wonderful, diverse, committed team we are: PWRDF Montreal. We are encouraging parishes without reps to elect a representative from one church or area to share information sent out and to participate in any way they are able. Our noon meetings on the second Thursday of most months have continued during the pandemic on zoom. In addition to learning and planning together, the meetings have also been, during the pandemic, an opportunity to encourage and support each other. While it feels as if fewer folks attend on zoom, there are some who would not be able to attend in-person downtown. Maybe at some point we will go hybrid. Everyone is welcome to attend, not just parish/area reps.

We have been continuing to have a yearly Diocesan PWRDF Project intended to bring our diocesan community together for a common educational goal and to raise funds in outreach to partners around the world. Last year, our Montreal group decided they wanted to support a Canadian Indigenous project. Our big plans for 2021 were to hold an event – expecting it to be a webinar – in October in support of PWRDF's new Indigenous Responsive Programs. As we write, it is finally coming to be! The Webinar "Decolonizing Fundraising" is on May 19th. We are honoured that the speakers are our National Indigenous Archbishop Mark MacDonald and Lisa Phillips, Director of <u>KORLCC, a language recovery</u> program in Kahnawake. The invitation will go to people beyond our diocesan limits. One of the benefits of the internet.

The Diocese of Montreal raised \$120,000. This includes churches and individuals. Keep in mind some churches are still remitting 2021 funds to us. Wow! We should be proud of the difference we choose to make. Thank you so very much everyone! Every time I think I can't be inspired more than I already am, I attend an event or see something updated and I am inspired more and again. PWRDF is such a gift to the world. So, we are, too.

A goodly number of our members attend the bi-weekly zoom "Praying with PWRDF" worship from Toronto on Thursdays at 1:00pm. In fact, we have changed our meeting time from a 12:00 start to 11:45, so we can head to Toronto.

Property Redevelopment

Goal

Support ongoing innovative property development including re-purposing, sales and church planting in order to transform properties from burdens into opportunity. After supporting designated ministries, the net proceeds of property sales will be invested to increase our revenues from investment income to offset the annual diocesan financial deficit; as well as be available to the benefit of strategic and viable parish ministries.

Methods

Diocesan staff, clergy and lay leaders are working together with the councils of the Diocese to help determine surplus diocesan property that should be sold in order to relieve the diocese of their expense in cases when there is insufficient benefit and use the proceeds to assist other diocesan ministries as prescribed under diocesan guidelines.

Outcomes

No parishes underwent a property evaluation/assessment in 2021 in order to address property concerns.

Summary

 We meet monthly as a committee of four (adding helpers for special projects); les membres sont tous capables de travailler en français et la langue du comité changera si nécessaire

Our Focus: All our activities are designed to **Make faithful stewardship of the environment possible and hopeful**, so that Anglicans can live out their faith; we aim to express our rationale ("to live out our faith") whenever we propose any activity

Our Three Approaches remain much as they were last year:

Policy Impact: We will seek guidance in recommending to the Bishop and Council to only support congregational spending requests for sustainable, energy-efficient initiatives

Expertise: In the areas of: identifying energy costs and inefficiencies; identifying appropriate technology; finding grants; grant writing.

Funding: Via grants, and by assessing where it would be valuable to invest as a diocese in strategic projects

At this point, we have been involved in two major projects, as well as some minor ones.

Involving all our Anglicans during the Season of Creation

We were very impressed by the Primate's letter to Prime Minister Trudeau prior to COP26. It was proudly Anglican: a reasonable, comprehensive and challenging response to God's call to care for creation (the Fifth Mark of Mission). We have begun plans to share that with every person attending worship on one Sunday during the Season of Creation (September 1 to October 4). We are developing talks based on Michele's experience with the UN Secretariat of the Convention on Biological Diversity.

These talks or sermon-time presentations will communicate the urgency of the situation and the practical steps we can each take as congregations and as concerned individuals. They will call our fellow worshippers into living more deeply into their faith.

Net-Zero Churches Project

Last year we entered into a research project with Professor Bruno Lee of the Concordia University Building Engineering Department. He and his team have begun work to identify heat loss from church buildings using thermal imaging, and to seek funding to expand that into some simple, basic recommendations for different models of church buildings that would help them to become Net Zero producers of Greenhouse Gasses (GHG).

To date we have done imaging of 14 churches and Bishop's Court, and this has been helpful in most cases. (Who knew that one of our churches effectively has radiant floor heating of the sanctuary, or that another was losing heat due to water damage to the insulation?)

This has led to an expanded project to collaborate with dioceses across the country to audit many church buildings, to develop recommendations and approximate costs for becoming net zero, and to identify grants to assist. Parish audits will be used as a way to involve members: how could their residences become net zero? They will then be encouraged to interact with their neighbours and acquaintances to help <u>them</u> see how they could, also. (In other words, we would be carrying good news out to our communities, which would give more credibility to the Good News which we represent). Finally, as we identify large numbers of "shovel-ready" projects, we will have a more powerful voice for helping our governments to remove the obstacles to change.

Along the way, we hope to help congregations assess their opportunities to become community hubs and even neighbourhood "energy hubs".

Four other diocesan environmental groups have joined this initiative, and the others are being invited to join. The cost to parishes has so far been zero, and the projected cost to dioceses is expected to be low.

Minor Projects that May Grow

We are working to develop policies to guide Diocesan decision-making in the areas of renovations (nothing that does not move us towards Net Zero; avoiding half measures that will have to be redone in the near future) and reducing GHGs from clergy and congregations (supporting public transport and electric cars, holding more Zoom meetings)

We have also arranged for free building inspections by Dawson students of two priority church buildings near Montréal.

Comité de l'intendance de l'environnement

Résumé

Nous nous réunissons mensuellement en tant que comité de quatre personnes (en ajoutant des assistants pour les projets spéciaux); les membres sont tous capables de travailler en français.

Notre objectif : Toutes nos activités sont conçues pour rendre possible et pleine d'espoir une intendance fidèle de l'environnement, afin que les anglicans puissent vivre leur foi avec cohérence; nous cherchons à exprimer notre raison d'être ("vivre notre foi") chaque fois que nous proposons une activité.

Nos trois approches restent sensiblement les mêmes que l'année dernière:

- Les politiques diocésaines: Nous chercherons à obtenir des conseils pour recommander à l'évêque et au Conseil de ne soutenir que les demandes de dépenses des congrégations pour des initiatives durables et efficaces sur le plan énergétique.
- **Expertise**: Dans les domaines suivants: identification des coûts énergétiques et des inefficacités en édifice; identification des technologies appropriées; recherche de subventions; rédaction de demandes de subventions.
- **Financement**: Via des subventions, et en évaluant où il serait utile d'investir en tant que diocèse dans des projets stratégiques.

À ce stade, nous avons été impliqués dans deux projets majeurs, ainsi que dans quelques projets mineurs.

Impliquer tous nos anglicans pendant la Saison de la Création

Nous avons été très impressionnés par la lettre du Primat au Premier Ministre Trudeau avant la COP26. Elle était fièrement anglicane: une réponse raisonnable, complète et stimulante à l'appel de Dieu à prendre soin de la création (la cinquième marque de la mission). Nous avons commencé à planifier le partage de cette réponse avec chaque personne assistant au culte sur un dimanche pendant la Saison de la Création (du 1er septembre au 4 octobre). Nous sommes en train d'élaborer des exposés basés sur l'expérience de Michele au Secrétariat des Nations Unies de la Convention sur la diversité biologique. Ces exposés ou présentations de sermon communiqueront l'urgence de la situation et les mesures pratiques que nous pouvons prendre en tant que congrégations et individus concernés. Elles inviteront nos fidèles à vivre plus profondément leur foi.

Projet: Églises Net-Zéro

L'année dernière, nous nous sommes engagés dans un projet de recherche avec le professeur Bruno Lee du département d'ingénierie en bâtiment de l'Université Concordia. Lui et son équipe ont commencé à identifier les pertes de chaleur dans les bâtiments d'église à l'aide de l'imagerie thermique, et à chercher des fonds pour étendre cette recherche à des recommandations simples et fondamentales pour différents modèles de bâtiments d'église qui les aideraient à devenir des producteurs net-zéro de gaz à effet de serre (GES).

À ce jour, nous avons réalisé l'imagerie de 14 églises et de la résidence de l'évêque, ce qui s'est avéré utile dans la plupart des cas. (Qui aurait pu savoir qu'une de nos églises disposait effectivement d'un chauffage par rayonnement au sol dans le sanctuaire, ou qu'une autre perdait de la chaleur en raison de dégâts d'eau dans son isolation)?

Cela a conduit à un projet élargi de collaboration avec les diocèses à travers le pays pour auditer de nombreux bâtiments d'église, pour élaborer des recommandations et des coûts approximatifs pour devenir net-zéro, et pour identifier des subventions pour aider. Les audits des paroisses seront utilisés comme moyen d'impliquer les membres: comment leurs résidences pourraient-elles devenir aussi net-zéro? Ils seront ensuite encouragés à interagir avec leurs voisins et leurs connaissances pour les aider à voir comment ils pourraient également le faire. (En d'autres termes, nous transmettrons la bonne nouvelle à nos communautés, ce qui donnera plus de crédibilité à la Bonne Nouvelle que nous représentons). Enfin, en identifiant un grand nombre de projets «prêts à démarrer», nous aurons une voix plus puissante pour encourager nos gouvernements à éliminer les obstacles au changement.

En cours de route, nous espérons aider les communautés chrétiennes à évaluer leurs possibilités de devenir des centres communautaires et même des "centres énergétiques" de quartier.

Quatre autres groupes environnementaux diocésains se sont joints à cette initiative (à cette date), et les autres sont invités à les rejoindre. Le coût pour les paroisses a été nul jusqu'à présent, et le coût prévu pour les diocèses devrait être faible.

Des projets mineurs qui peuvent prendre de l'ampleur

Nous travaillons à l'élaboration de politiques pour guider la prise de décision du diocèse dans le domaine des rénovations (rien qui ne nous rapproche de Net-Zero; éviter les demi-mesures qui devront être refaites dans un avenir proche) et de la réduction des GES émises par le clergé et les communautés chrétiennes (soutenir les transports publics et les voitures électriques, organiser plus de réunions Zoom).

Nous avons également organisé des inspections gratuites par des étudiants de Dawson de deux bâtiments d'église prioritaires près de Montréal.

Synod Planning Committee

2021 was again a unique synod – a conference synod online – a product of health restrictions resulting from the Covid-19 pandemic. The 162nd annual Synod of the Diocese of Montreal took place from Friday, May 14th to Saturday, May 15th. With the province in various stages of lockdown, the coronavirus making it impossible for groups to gather safely, we gathered virtually via Zoom to conduct the business of Synod (six months after the 2020 gathering of Synod – also via zoom). The head table consisting of Bishop Mary, the Chancellor and the Vicar General met in Fulford Hall with Diocesan staff in the background to manage the various technical aspects of an on-line gathering while synod delegates and the Synod guest speaker gathered from all over the province of Quebec (and Ontario).

Committee members for 2021 included The Reverend Chris Barrigar, Canon Neil Mancor, Archdeacons Victor-David Mbuyi Bipungu & Robert Camara, and, Mr. Dion Lewis. We were thankful for the continued staff support of Ms. Sophie Bertrand who looked after the day-to-day planning in preparation of our Synod meeting.

This was a two-day conference and business session which continued the theme of Evangelism from the previous two years. We had the opportunity to hear from the Rev. Dr. Judy Paulsen with the theme of "The Challenge of Evangelism: How do we invite people" and looked at ways of practical evangelism in our context. Members of synod broke up into workshops to discuss contextual issues of evangelism within emerging communities; a Quebec multicultural society; children, youth and young adult ministries; church planting; rethinking evangelism and the importance of context. On Saturday, Synod members reconvened on zoom webinar to hear one final address from the Rev Dr. Judy Paulsen and to address the business of synod which included, as usual, among other things diocesan finances, reports, elections, appointments, questions, presentations, motions, worship, fellowship and the Bishop's Charge; as recorded in the official minutes.

Following from the 2020 and 2021 synod discussions, the upcoming 3 synods will look at issues of anti-racism in the triennium.

We are grateful to all those who through their participation in these endeavours contributed to the success of this Synod. Our thanks to Bishop Mary Irwin Gibson, Chancellor David Eramian, Treasurer Ron O'Connell, Director of Finance Stephen Tam and Diocesan Staff, Synod secretaries, the Reverend Sophie Rolland and Valerie Taylor for their leadership and assistance in the organization and implementation of Synod.

Comité de planification du synode

L'année 2021 a été une fois de plus un synode unique - un synode conférence en ligne - un produit des restrictions sanitaires résultant de la pandémie de Covid-19. Le 162^e synode annuel du diocèse de Montréal a eu lieu du vendredi 14 au samedi 15 mai. La province étant à divers stades de confinement, le coronavirus empêchant les groupes de se réunir en toute sécurité, nous nous sommes réunis virtuellement via Zoom pour mener les affaires du Synode (six mois après la réunion du Synode de 2020 - également via Zoom). La table d'honneur, composée de l'évêque Mary, du chancelier et du vicaire général, s'est réunie à Fulford Hall avec le personnel diocésain en arrière-plan pour gérer les divers aspects techniques d'une réunion en ligne, tandis que les délégués et le conférencier invité du Synode se réunissaient de partout au Québec (et en Ontario).

Les membres du comité de planification du synode pour 2021 étaient le révérend Chris Barrigar, le chanoine Neil Mancor, les archidiacres Victor-David Mbuyi Bipungu et Robert Camara, et M. Dion Lewis. Nous sommes reconnaissants pour le soutien continu de Mme Sophie Bertrand qui s'est occupé de la planification quotidienne en préparation de notre réunion synodale.

Il s'agissait d'une conférence de deux jours qui a poursuivi le thème de l'évangélisation des deux années précédentes. Nous avons eu l'occasion d'entendre le Révérend Dr Judy Paulsen sur le thème "Le défi de l'évangélisation : comment inviter les gens" et nous avons examiné les moyens d'évangélisation pratiques dans notre contexte. Les membres du synode se sont répartis en ateliers pour discuter des questions contextuelles de l'évangélisation au sein des communautés émergentes, de la société multiculturelle québécoise, des ministères auprès des enfants, des jeunes et des jeunes adultes, de l'implantation d'églises, mais aussi afin de repenser l'évangélisation et l'importance du contexte. Le samedi, les membres du synode se sont réunis à nouveau via le webinaire zoom pour entendre une dernière allocution de la Révérende Dr Judy Paulsen et pour aborder les affaires du synode qui comprenaient, comme d'habitude, entre autres, les finances diocésaines, les rapports, les élections, les nominations, les questions, les présentations, les résolutions, le culte, la communion et la charge de l'évêque ; tel qu'enregistré dans le procès-verbal officiel.

Suite aux discussions des synodes de 2020 et 2021, au cours du prochain triennat, les synodes se pencheront sur les questions d'antiracisme.

Chaplaincies

Brome – Missisquoi-Perkins Hospital, Cowansville Sinpoh Han

Although I have been making pastoral visits over the past two years, pastoral rounds in the BMP continue to remain restricted. I am still not permitted to make my rounds the way that I had been doing prior to the pandemic, to initiate pastoral visits on my own, taking a hospital patients list and freely doing my rounds. As it has been these last two years, my visits were restricted to patients, who have specifically requested visits from the clergy, or hospital staff, who have requested visits from clergy on behalf of patients. These protocols still are in place, and have remained this way for over two years.

As I will be retiring at the end of July, I will also be leaving the position of hospital chaplain at the BMP. I have been assured by the Chef du service expérience usagers et soins spirituels that the position will continue on after I leave. I had a meeting with him in late March this year to discuss this. Furthermore, Archdeacon Tim Smart, the territorial archdeacon for Bedford and Brome Shefford-, will also be meeting with him in the coming weeks to talk about the possibility of our local Anglican clergy continuing to provide chaplaincy services at the hospital.

Concordia University Multi-Faith Chaplaincy Ellie Hummel

As I write this, it is mid-February. Who would have thought that we would be starting year three of pandemic living soon? Who would have ever dreamed that we would find ourselves in this desert time for so many months, even years? And like our ancestors in the faith, times spent in the wilderness are challenging.

Here at the Concordia Multi-faith and Spirituality Centre, we have learned to do things differently, without the comfort our spaces, our kettle and coffee pots, and without our usual ways of offering hospitality and welcome. Instead, we have learned to build community that is both virtual and real. Our most regular way of connecting has been through our weekly mid-week chill, where people can gather and connect in a way that is authentic and supportive. We have found ways of being with students that support them in their isolation and in their quest for mental well-being. Sometimes, a simple email, message or call can be a lifeline. We have experimented with new ways of reaching out, as many of us experienced zoom fatigue. For that reason, last year's two-day virtual Discover Multi-faith Fair was transformed into a series of three Discover Multi-faith Events. While the format changes, the goals to increase religious literacy and interfaith collaboration remain constant. The social media connections, especially through messaging, reels and contests, seem to have made an impact. We have tried to be nimble and adjust to ever-changing regulations, and to learn from each other and with each other.

There are other changes coming to the Multi-faith and Spirituality Centre. After over 22 years as Chaplain and Coordinator, I am leaving the position to explore other adventures. I am grateful for the many encounters, conversations and experiences I have had while at Concordia. I am grateful for the long-standing support of the Diocese of Montreal and the strong relationships of our institutions, as well as the personal support by many colleagues.

Change, whether through staff changes or a pandemic, always invite reflection and visioning. That is the opportunity that wilderness times offer. In the coming months, the Concordia Multi-faith and Spirituality Centre will engage in some thoughtful reflection, dreaming and planning. The Centre will find ways to best serve the students, along with the larger community, in ways that are meaningful and that contribute to building the world we all long for, a world of peace, of understanding and of hope. May the journey continue and may we each in our own ways continue to share God's love.

Federal Prison Chaplaincy – Cowansville Institution *Tim Smart*

At the beginning of 2021, Chaplains were not allowed inside of the prison except for emergencies. Later in the spring, I was able to return, but was limited to visiting individuals in the various pavilions as they were in semi-lockdown.

The men were generally bored, restless, depressed and feeling cut off from family and friends.

Phone calls and Zoom visits with family continued, but there was little else to do during lockdown since work, school and gym were curtailed.

Summer saw a re-opening of the blocks, but our faithful volunteers were only allowed to return in December of 2021 for group activities (before we locked down again at the end of 2021 for another three months).

In December, we hosted 3 Monday evenings Chapel gatherings, and one meeting of the Book Club. Other than these brief encounters our volunteers and the men did not see much of each other for the whole year. However, the volunteers continued to write letters to the men throughout the year offering them encouragement and friendship. I am very grateful to Bob Morell, Pamela Dillon, Tyson Rosberg, Helen Elsworth, Rozalia Shewchuk, Louise Hoelscher, and Gaelies and Gordon Renny.

I was able to continue my individual visits for most of the year, trying to bring a friendly face and some caring in a place that was more cut off than usual from the outside world.

Federal Prison Chaplaincy – Federal Training Centre, Laval *Peter Huish*

As I write at the beginning of April 2022 yet another closure has just been announced of the institution where I serve with a number of other chapel volunteers. Since March of 2020 when closures due to the COVID-19 pandemic commenced, in-person access by those of us who complement the work of a contracted full-time institutional chaplain has been limited to a couple of months of strictly limited access in the Fall of 2021. This new closure is occasioned by a positive Covid-19 test of one inmate. Its duration will depend upon what is revealed in testing of all others, inmates and staff.

Our limited access to the institution's two chapels (two separate prison sites) in those 2 months or so last Fall were permitted for two chaplaincy visitors each time, for some 90 minutes, with a few masked and distanced inmates (5 at one site and 8 at the other, given the respective chapel space dimensions). We have all become quite familiar with such mandated restrictions in the wider community and have endured them for the common welfare, with responsibility, assisted by lots of creative adaptations. But for prison inmates, possible adaptations have been few and these two years have involved drastic challenges of isolation, restriction of activity, cessation of work, learning, programs, chaplaincy services and visits.

The 2-month reprieve in the fall of 2021 came abruptly to an end nationally when a few cases appeared in the federal correctional system at the beginning of the Omicron wave. It was at a point when plans were opening for less restricted access for visitors of all kinds including chapel visits and activities, and for restarting step-wise, of community work-release and community service outings as well as of personal development opportunities such as *Open Door* meetings at Fulford Hall. These plans are still on hold in April of 2022 and the single positive test case identified now has further delayed the resumption even of our limited-access chapel visits of last Fall.

CSC has taken some steps to mitigate the impact of COVID related restrictions on inmates for which we as committed accompaniers of the prisoners are both supportive and grateful. Of special blessing for us and for our beneficiaries in the prisons is the opening in the last 2 months of telephone access so that some of us, accredited chaplaincy personnel, can have regular telephone meetings with select inmates, making it possible to resume meaningful pastoral accompaniment of those who desire it.

We give thanks for this blessing and continue to pray for the men and that greater relief for the extraordinary penalties they are forced to endure may quickly be forthcoming. Please hold us all in your prayers.

Mouvement Communitas

Although I had little choice one year ago but to tell you of some ways in which our work, very much based on community-making and building, had been compromised because of pandemic related restrictions of movement and contact, I am grateful and buoyed up to report that this last year has been a banner year for *Communitas*. It can be said that this is in spite of the challenges and setbacks related to the pandemic but in some important ways it is because of it, in that leadership has emerged to reshape our operations, to create new initiatives that respond to present realities and constraints while sustaining what is essential in our mission of social reintegration of those who have fallen out of community. This leadership has come from all parts of our membership: the gifted, committed and very active members of our Board of Directors, our staff members and many of our volunteers for whom the life we share together as "communitas" is a vocation that engages them fully, and our formerly incarcerated members whose participation and articulated needs give direction to those who manage our resources and facilitate what we do.

These responsive shifts have included moving our base from our Saint-Henri location of the last eight years to the Undercroft of Christ Church Cathedral where the space is attractive, accessible and convenient for our members and suitable for our administrative, project and volunteer support needs. It is also helpful to be on the same premises as Fulford Hall, where our flagship activity and entry point, *Open Door* takes place each week.

While *Open Door* by way of Zoom enabled us to keep much of our membership connected and the community alive during the period of restrictions, for which we are grateful, we were able during the Fall to experiment with a hybrid approach in anticipation of resuming in-person meetings when regulations and safety considerations permitted. At the time of writing, weekly in-person *Open Door* meetings have resumed.

Another innovation this year which now blesses us in the community is convening on Zoom our regular *Gospel Zone* meetings - enjoyed for many years as the regular chapel activity in the prisons we serve and from which we receive our members. It is regularly attended by the volunteer prison visitors for whom this shared engagement and reflection has become nourishing and life-giving. We are joined by those exprisoners in the community who are able to do so. These "virtual" meetings serve us well, until we are able to resume them in person when the prisons are once again opened for our in-reach.

We are keen to return to the prison chapel where our circle is completed by the prisoners, each of whom we welcome as one of us, a fellow traveler, and sojourner in this place of intentional Gospel love, inclusion and belonging. An important part of our commitment and movement towards resumption of our coming together in this way was the short period of 2 months or so in the Fall when very small gatherings were

allowed by the correctional service in the prisons' chapels. Although these came to a halt with the arrival of the Omicron wave, we are yet encouraged, and confident that they will resume when the present pause can be lifted.

The "banner" event of this year was the celebration of 20 years of *Open Door* meetings, about 15 years of which have been in Fulford Hall, where the Diocese and the Cathedral have been our hosts. We marked the occasion with publication of a book, *Open Door – from the Inside Out,* which showcases some 150 accounts of the significance of the *Open Door* experience, giving a wonderful portrait of the impact this project has had on the lives of several thousand people and of the service to and benefit of our wider community. The book has attracted interest and attention from the CBC and CJAD radio with several interviews being done with our staff and volunteers. A link to the CBC piece can be found here:

St. Margaret's Residential Centre, Westmount

I continue to carry out by chaplaincy responsibilities at St, Margaret's. For the last eight years I have been going in twice a week to do my pastoral rounds. Although my pastoral focus is primarily on the residents, I have also established connections with the staff and the families of residents. On several occasions throughout these eight years at St. Margaret's, I have had the opportunity to rejoice with them during happy times and to grieve with them during sad times.

Over these past few months, St. Margaret's has been slowly and carefully opening up and easing restrictions. Currently, there are no longer any restrictions regarding visitors coming in, other than sanitizing their hands and wearing masks.

During the height of the pandemic in 2020, St. Margaret's was indeed extremely rigorous in its enforcement of the government health measures but immediate family members and appointed care givers were permitted to visit provided they gave advanced notice and had their names put on the list. Also, last summer, for several

months, all members of the staff were required to put on hospital uniforms that were provided by St. Margaret's. This continued until the early fall when we resumed wearing our own clothes.

We are well into May 2022, and there have been no other reported cases of Covid. Over a period of two years, from the start of the pandemic, in 2020 until the end of 2021, it has contained its spread very successfully.

I continue with our weekly chapel services. Since late April, the residents have all been able to gather together in a large space for worship. Over the past two years, except for a period of three months, March until June 2020, chapel services were restricted to each floor having its own separate service for only the residents on that floor. As there are three floors, three separate chapel services were held during those two years. The residents on all three floors now can congregate together, and they have been doing so for the last few weeks, in one large group, in the activities room that serves as our chapel for the weekly service.

The weekly chapel service consists of the singing of hymns, bible readings and the administering of Communion in both kinds, the service for Morning Prayer lasts for about 20-25 minutes, and would include scriptural readings, Prayers of the People, the Lord's Prayer, Creed, and Christian hymns and songs on CD.

My role as chaplain is to continue to provide the spiritual dimension for all the residents, whether or not they have any religious affinity or denominational differences.

As restrictions continue to ease, although mask wearing and hand sanitizing remain mandatory, regular daily activities are returning to a sense of normalcy

There Recreation Department continues to organize a number of daily activities during the week such as group games and having musicians coming in to entertain the residents.

Movement between floors is no longer restricted. At one time, visitors were not permitted to visit others they may know who might be on another floor. Over the past few months such restrictions have greatly eased. Whereas for quite a long period of time visitors were required to remain in the room of the person they are caring for the duration of their visits, they can now enter and leave without a problem. The dining rooms are again accessible to the residents who wish to have their meals there. However, mask wearing in both the CHSLDs and hospitals remain mandatory for staff and visitors.

One auspicious event that that took place in mid May as the result of the easing of restrictions was the Memorial service to commemorate the lives of our residents, who had died in the last two years, in 2020 and 2021. It was originally intended to be a service commemorating the residents who died of Covid 19. However, it has now come to include all residents who have died in the last two years. It was held on May 16th and was organized by St. Margaret's Residents Committee, and included the participation of some of St. Margaret's staff, its administration, the Recreation Department, members of the Residents Committee, and me.

I shared this last year, and I would like to reiterate. St. Margaret's continues to serve the wider community, and plays an integral role in the wellbeing of those who require long term care in the absence of personal autonomy or family care. Communities such as St. Margaret's Residential Centre continue to remain vital in the lives of many people who depend on the dedication of those who have committed themselves to fulfilling these responsibilities St. Margaret's holds its residents and their families, to whom they have entrusted the care and the wellbeing of their loved ones, in the highest degree possible. We continue to extend our appreciation and thanks, and a resounding round of applause, especially given what many have experienced during the height of the global health crisis. Because of their compassion and diligence in abiding by the necessary protocols over these past two years, St. Margaret's has well contained the spread of this dreadful pandemic within its building. We rejoice that we can, once again, welcome members of the public, including family members and friends, and care givers, of our residents.

Canon Dr. Judy Paulsen and breakout group Workshops (See below) on a variety of topics relative to the Conference Synod Theme-

The Challenges of Evangelism: How Do We Invite People?

2021 Conference Synod Workshops

The Importance of Context: Dr. Glen Smith, Presbyterian College

Coming out of our shells in the context of the secularity, galloping pluralities and the inequalities of our society. Contemporary society has a puzzling way of leading followers of Jesus to feel "muzzled". After defining the secularity, pluralities and the inequalities we face, we will look at some practical ways that parishes can bear witness to Jesus and all his teachings in word and deed.

Rethinking Evangelism: Dr. Dominic Ruso

Everyday we are invited to share things with people. If you are like me you've been encouraged to share a book review, a quote, a video. While that can be easy, it seems like sharing about one's faith continues to be much more challenging. Join us in this discussion as Dr. Domenic Ruso highlights what might be going on as we rethink evangelism in these changing times.

Lessons Learned from A New Community: The Rev. Graham Singh and Ms. Marney Matoga

In the beginning nobody knows your community and everyone is new in a church plant. Come and listen to some of the stories and talk about some of the lessons learned in welcoming everyone for the first time in a completely new community. Hear from the incumbent and one of the lay leaders of St. Jax, this vibrant new community in downtown Montreal and learn about some of the things that worked and some that required changes along the way.

Emerging Conversations: Ms. Lee-Ann Matthews & Mr. Andrew Rennie

There has been much to say about emerging expressions of Church as a way to reach new people. In this session we will hear from two practitioners: Andrew Rennie-Smith who helped co-found St Brigid's Community in Vancouver, and Lee-Ann Matthews who leads the Supper Club in Montreal. These two very different expressions of Church have both created space for people who do not normally go to Church to express doubt and explore faith, and in doing so begin to find their way towards the Christian community.

Lessons from Children and Youth Ministries at the Church of St Mark & St Peter (CMP):

Ms. June Lashley & Diana Keener. June Lashley wears several hats at CMP, including Youth Ministry Coordinator; she is also completing a degree in theology. Diana Keener is Coordinator for Children and Family Ministries at CMP. Di has worked as a parenting educator serving families in difficulty, and has served on the Board of Governors for Beurling Academy in Verdun. Children and youth ministry are a cornerstone of community life at CMP, and represent CMP's growth demographic of young families. Di and June will provide an overview of how they approach ministry with these age groups, and provide insight into some of the lessons they have learned about building children and youth ministry today.

Ministry to Children: The Rev. Grace Burson

In Quebec in 2021, it's been two full generations since "going to church" was a broadbased social expectation. Many of our parishes would love to welcome children and young families, but don't know where to start or how to make "church" appealing to those who know little or nothing about it. There are no one-size-fits-all answers, but All Saints by the Lake in Dorval has seen some surprising growth and flourishing among families with young children in the last few years, and we warmly invite you to this session to hear some of what's worked for us, and share our best practices together!

Ministry to Young Adults: The Rev. Jean-Daniel O'Donncada

The Rev. Jean-Daniel O'Donncada is a university chaplain at McGill University and working with young adults. Join Jean-Daniel as he shares his experiences working as a chaplain and take part in a discussion on ministry to young adults.

Reflections on the Challenges of Evangelism and Q&A

Following a short break, the Bishop invited the Rev. Canon Dr. Judy Paulsen to share her reflections on the Challenges of Evangelism joined by the Rev. Canon Dr. Neil Mancor who moderated the Q&A session.

Canon Paulsen began her reflections by speaking on Change in the Church and how this cannot be approached simply as a "technical fix" but more as an "adaptive challenge". She also touched on the role of the clergy in Post Christendom and how old fundraising models such as rummage sales and bazaars cannot be relied on to bail us out of the need for more fundamental change. Canon Paulsen shared a series of slides elaborating on these topics and focusing on the reality of the hard work required for disciple-making. Members added their comments in the chat box. Bishop Mary thanked Canon Paulsen for being with us in this Synod and for providing much food for thought and inspiration for moving forward.

Finance Q&A, Audited Statements and Budget 2022

The Bishop invited the Treasurer and Mr. Stephen Tam to facilitate a Q&A session from Members in response to the video of the Finance Report, which has been available for viewing on the Diocesan Website.

The Treasurer gave a brief overview of results for 2020, plans for 2021 and the 2022 Budget, noting that in 2020 the Diocese suffered a loss of 1.8 mill. due to the pandemic. He then asked if there were any questions from Members.

A number of members asked for clarification around the advantages and disadvantages of the Diocese having applied for the Federal Government Wage Subsidy (CEWS) and the waiving of assessments to Parishes. Mr. Tam responded to these questions and shared a slide he had prepared, providing details. In 2020 the Diocese received 1.8mill from the subsidy and this money does not need to be paid back. The government is talking about extending CEWS to September, 2021, which would mean not invoicing Parishes for assessments for 9 months of 2021. This will result in a loss of 1mill, however the diocese still benefits by participating in the subsidy program.

There was short discussion regarding the possibility of having some type of post Pandemic forum to look at ways Parishes might help each other and to consider new ways of looking at the "big picture". Bishop Mary noted that Diocesan Council wrestles with this type of topic.

The Bishop called for the motion to Receive the Financial Statements. Mr. Ron O'Connell seconded by the Ven. Robert Camara **moved** the motion, which was voted upon. **Carried.**

The Treasurer then proceeded to the 2022 Budget, asking if there were any comments from Members. He mentioned that there will be a small increase in assessments and that there is a projected operating loss of 444K for 2022. Mr. Stephen Tam's excellent notes provide further details.

Mr. Ron O'Connell seconded by the Ven. Robert Camara **moved** the motion to approve the 2022 Budget.

The Bishop noted that Diocesan Council will be meeting in June and will be discussing the June-September assessments. Several members spoke in support of continuing to apply for CEWS.

If Parishes have done well financially during the pandemic they should consider paying the equivalent of their assessments after the subsidy ends, since the Diocese will not be eligible to apply if the income is received at this time as the government will see the funds as accounts receivable. The motion was voted upon. **Carried.** Bishop Mary thanked the Treasurer and Mr. Tam for all their hard work on behalf of the Diocese.

Other Business

The Bishop invited Mr. Dion Lewis, co-Chair of the Anti Racism Task Force to give a report on their work over the past year.

The text of the report is included below: -

Thank you, Bishop Mary members and guests of Synod;

Last year, Synod passed a motion to work on dismantling Anti-Black Racism in the Diocese of Montreal. Edward Yankie and I are the co-chairs of the Anti-Racism Task Force and we have been given this time to update Synod on the work of the task force up until now and to inform you of upcoming events. Members of the task force are the Rev. Deborah Meister, the Rev. Deborah Noonan Zink, the Rev. Christopher Belle, the. Rev James Pratt and Mr. Jean Briddy Sainville. We have also invited different guests and advisors to come and be helpful companions to the task force along the way: Mrs. Camille Isaacs-Morell, the Rev. Graham Singh and the Rev. Jason Crawford. Our task force adopted this as our mission statement.

"To educate and increase awareness in the Anglican Diocese of Montreal of the history of racism and the church's participation and complicity in racist practices, that we may properly repent. To equip and enable members of the diocese to confront and dismantle systemic racism and white supremacy inside and outside the church. To honour Christ's presence in every human by building bridges and promoting and celebrating diversity in the church and the world."

The task force sent out a survey to all the leaders of our local church communities. Thank you to everyone that took the time to answer and give their input.

The results of this survey helped us to determine the main concerns and the missing pieces we needed to overcome and as a diocese provide support for. The results showed generally that we do not know enough about the history of the Church and how it has been used to distort and homogenize the diversity that God has created. It also highlighted that, individually, we each must take the time to reflect on our own personal commitment to be an Anti Racist so that our communities become Anti Racist. Furthermore, some responses to the survey gave some concrete ways to change our Diocesan and Provincial structures in order to make room for a leadership team that reflected the members of the Diocese even more than it does now. The task force has discussed and noted that there is a lack of formal integration programs and representation in diocesan decision-making, this leads to the perception that as a Diocese we do not regard ethnic congregations with equal importance as largely white congregations. We are diligently studying all the suggestions and looking at setting out proposals to implement those changes that

would work in our context here. Stay tuned because these proposals will be coming forth from the task force and will be on the floor in the coming synod gatherings should God spare our lives and allow us to continue to bring about the kingdom of heaven on earth.

The task force has also been compiling and critiquing current written, audio and video resources, and making connections with many community organisations and ecumenical partners that have implemented educational programs locally and in Canada. This included attending some of the Mandatory training programs that the United Church offers for all their Clergy and lay leaders and reviewing resources offered by the World Council of Churches. We have also collected resources for parents and children.

The task force, via our Bishop, is supporting the work of the Anti Racism Working Group at the National Church level. All these resources will be listed and soon be accessible via a dedicated page on the diocesan website. We will continue to review current faith-based Anti Racism programs to create/design training for lay and clergy leaders. The goal for this is to make training a mandatory and renewable requirement.

A next Initiative from the task force is to have a private Facebook page for the members of our Diocese to "share ideas and to support one-another in rooting out racism in ourselves, our churches and our world"- Montreal Anglicans for Racial Justice and Equity. It is a private group and as soon as we complete our branding and logo, we will start inviting members of the diocese to start to comment and share on this page. The Anti Racism Task Force members will be the moderators.

At the beginning of October (1 & 2) the Anti Racism Task Force and the Diocese of Montreal will be holding a 2-session workshop on the History of Systematic Racism in the Church this will be an interactive workshop geared to all leaders in our diocese and our neighbouring ones.

The first session would be – Looking back to look forward/ Imperialism, Colonialism/ and its aftermath/ God, Church and Commerce/ Religion and racial inequality.

The second session would be – Addressing the present to move into the future/ How do get beyond Thoughts and Prayers/ Church leaders as social and political activists/ The church's role in, and responsibility to, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion.

Please be on the lookout for this offering and encourage all your lay and clergy leaders to attend.

Let me quote from the Bishop's charge: -

"All of us in the diocese are asked to take on the work of education and increased awareness of sub-conscious and conscious attitudes and behaviours that undermine racial justice and equity in our society." Let me add- When we all really start to do this work, we are just aiming for the goal of creating the society that Christ calls us to live in and to be leaders in the Anglican Church in Canada and the world.

Independent Auditor's Report

To the members of The Synod of The Diocese of Montreal

Opinion

We have audited the consolidated financial statements of The Synod of The Diocese of Montreal (the "Synod") and its controlled entity (the "Group"), which comprise the consolidated statement of financial position as at December 31, 2021, the consolidated statements of general fund income and expenditures, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the consolidated financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying consolidated financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the consolidated financial position of The Synod as at December 31, 2021, and its consolidated results of operations and its consolidated cash flows for the year ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Group in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the consolidated financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Consolidated Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.



Independent Auditor's Report

In preparing the consolidated financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Group's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Group or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Group's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these consolidated financial statements.

1. Significant Accounting Policies

The purpose of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal ("Synod") is to provide the administrative, legislative and management structures and processes that enable the Diocese to achieve its objectives.

The Synod is a partner in the worldwide Anglican Communion and in the universal Church.

The Synod, its faithful people and its associated parishes are called to:

- proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom;
- teach, baptize and nurture new believers;
- respond to human need by loving service;
- seek to transform unjust structures of society;
- strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.

These objectives are achieved by:

- valuing our heritage of biblical faith, reason, liturgy, tradition, bishops and synods, and the rich variety of our life in community;
- acknowledging that God is calling us to greater diversity of membership, wider participation in ministry and leadership, better stewardship in God's creation and a stronger resolve in challenging attitudes and structures that cause injustice;
- committing ourselves to respond in love and service and so more fully live the life of Christ, guided by the Holy Spirit.

The Synod was created by Letters Patent of Queen Victoria on July 18, 1851. The Synod is the legislative body which governs the Diocese. It was created in 1859 under the authority of "An act to Enable the Members of the United Church of England and Ireland in Canada to Meet in Synod" (1857), and was subsequently incorporated by "An Act to Incorporate the Members of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal", and to merge "The Church Society of Montreal" into such Synod (1868).

The Synod is a registered charitable organization and is exempt from income taxes.

December 31, 2021

1. Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

These consolidated financial statements include assets administered and liabilities incurred by the Synod but do not include the assets, liabilities, income and expenses of the parishes of the Synod.

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

- **Basis of Consolidation** The consolidated financial statements include the accounts of the Synod and those of its controlled entity, the Andrews Home. All significant intercompany transactions and balances have been eliminated on consolidation.
- **Revenue Recognition** The Synod follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. This method involves deferring any restricted contributions to future periods and matching these revenues with these selected expenses when they are incurred.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred.

Endowment contributions are recorded as direct increases in net assets. All other contributions are reported as revenue of this current period.

Investment income includes interest, which is recognized pro rata over the term of the instrument, dividend income, which is recorded on the ex-dividend date and distribution income derived from a mutual fund, which is recognized on an accrual basis.

Rental income and ground rent is recognized on a straight-line basis over the lease term and it is based on the terms of the agreement between the members of the Church Group.

Management fees are recognized when the Diocese's right to receive the payment is established and when collection is reasonably assured.

Deferred Benefit Liability The Synod provides post-retirement benefits to its clergy. The cost of post-retirement benefits earned by clergy is determined using the projected benefit method prorated on service and management's best estimate of expected costs, discount rate, health care cost trend rate, retirement and mortality age of clergy. Actuarial gains (losses) arising from changes in actuarial assumptions used to determine the accrued benefit obligation are recognized in the statement of changes in net assets. An actuarial valuation as of December 31, 2021 was used to calculate the benefit cost and the accrued liability for the year ended December 31, 2021.

Financial Instruments Measurement of Financial Instruments

The Synod initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value. The Synod subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost with the exception of investments and marketable securities held-in-trust which are subsequently measured at fair value based on closing market prices. In addition, all bonds and guaranteed investment certificates have been designated to be in the fair value category, with gains and losses reported in operations.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash, accounts receivable and loans receivable.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include accounts payable and mortgage loan payable.

Impairment

Financial assets measured at amortized cost are tested for impairment when there are indicators of impairment. The previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement, directly or by adjusting the allowance account, provided it is not greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of reversal had the impairment not been recognized previously. The amount of impairment and any reversal is recognized in the statement of general fund income and expenditures.

Investments in the Anglican Balanced Fund

The Anglican Balanced Fund is a mutual fund trust established under a Declaration of Trust dated November 8, 1967 subsequently amended June 7, 1991. The trust is administered by a Board of Trustees. The direct beneficiaries of the Fund are the registered unitholders. Funds are invested in a balanced portfolio of bonds and shares.

The treasurer of the Synod is the chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Anglican Balanced Fund. The Synod also appoints three of six trustees and thus has significant influence over the organization's operations.

4. Investment in 147368 Canada Inc.

The building formerly known as Anglican House was demolished in an earlier year. The land which it occupied, together with the land held by Christ Church Cathedral and the Canadian Bible Society, was transferred to 147368 Canada Inc. (the "company") which is jointly owned by the Synod and the other two entities ("Church Group"). The company was incorporated on October 9, 1985 under the *Canada Business Corporations Act* in order to act as agent for its shareholders in emphyteutic leases (the "Lease") under which the land was leased for a term ending in the year 2084, for the purpose of constructing an office tower and underground retail complex. Ownership of the land together with any emplacement thereon reverts to the Church Group at the termination of the Lease. The lessor has the option to terminate the lease in 2060 provided the lessor pays an amount equal to the fair market value. The investment is carried at a nominal value representing 40% (40 of 100 common shares) of the issued shares.

The management of the Synod is closely involved in developing the strategic operating policies of 147368 Canada Inc. and thus has significant influence over the company's operations.

5. Ground Rent

The Synod's share of the proceeds of the leases referred to in Note 4 amounted to \$371,754 (2020 - \$371,754). In addition, the Synod may receive additional amounts based on the annual cash flows derived from the office tower and underground retail complex after absorbing accumulated losses from previous years and may share in the proceeds of any sale or refinancing of the project during the term of the leases.

The credit line amount is guaranteed by a registered first-rank movable hypothec on the universality of an amount of \$400,000. As at December 31, 2021, there was an outstanding amount of \$124,000 on the credit facility (2020 - \$190,000).

The externally restricted funds are limited to studies leading to ordained ministry, French ministry, social services and special projects.

The Episcopal Funds are held on behalf of the Bishop as Corporation Sole and are under the control of the Bishop, acting in consultation with the Treasurer. Income generated from the underlying assets is transferred from the Episcopal Funds to General Fund to support Episcopal expenses.

12. Interfund Transfers

Restricted Funds of \$187,436 (2020 - \$157,048) were transferred to the General Fund to meet expenses, which are analyzed to ensure that specific use requirements are met and approved by the Bishop.

13. Donations

The Synod received, as an agent, the following donations which will be transferred directly to the related organization and are not recorded in the consolidated statement of general fund income and expenditures.

16. Controlled Entity

The Andrews Home is a corporation controlled by the Synod since the management of the Synod was closely involved in developing the policies of the Andrews Home and can control the content. The Andrews Home, incorporated by statute of the legislature of the Province of Québec cited as 58 Victoria, chapter 88 assented to on January 12, 1895, is a social service agency operated under the direction of the Bishop of Montreal for the furtherance of the objects and purposes of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal in its charitable work. The institution is a registered charity under the *Income Tax Act*.

17. Pension Plan

The Synod is a member of a contributory, defined benefit pension plan for the Diocesan clergy and Synod employees under which benefits are computed in relation to the number of years of service. The Synod office also administers a defined contribution pension plan for lay employees of parishes and other entities within the Diocese.

Pension expense for the Diocesan clergy and lay employees was \$130,783 for the year ended December 31, 2021 (2020 - \$132,843).

18. Risks Arising from Financial Instruments

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. The Synod is exposed to credit risk in relation to accounts receivable, loans receivable and investments held. The Synod mitigates this risk by dealing with creditworthy financial institutions and counterparties. The Synod is not exposed to a significant concentration of credit risk as no balance represents a significant portion of the amount outstanding. Total credit risk is limited to the amounts recorded in the statement of financial position.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Synod manages this risk by monitoring working capital and cash flow needs.

Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: interest rate risk, currency risk and other price risk. Each of these risks is discussed hereunder.

18. Risks Arising from Financial Instruments (continued)

Interest rate risk

The Synod is exposed to interest rate risk with investments in bonds and debentures that are held by the mutual funds in which it holds units. The yield and fair value of these investments will vary in response to changes in the prevailing market interest rates. The Synod mitigates this risk by holding a diversified portfolio of fixed-term debt instruments.

Currency risk

The Synod is exposed to foreign currency risk indirectly as investments held by the mutual funds in which it holds units include investments denominated in foreign currency (primarily in U.S. dollars) that fluctuate in value as exchange rates move.

Other price risk

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual financial instrument or its issuer, or factors affecting all similar financial instruments traded in the market. The Synod is exposed to price risk from its investment portfolio. The Synod moderates this risk through the selection and diversification of securities held within the portfolio.

There has been no change to the Synod's exposure to the above risks from the previous period.

19. Uncertainty Due to COVID-19

On January 30, 2020, The World Health Organization ("WHO") announced a global health emergency because of a new strain of coronavirus originating in Wuhan, China (the "COVID-19 outbreak") and the risks to the international community as the virus spreads globally beyond its point of origin. On March 11, 2020, the WHO classified the COVID-19 outbreak as a pandemic, based on the rapid increase in exposure globally. Management is actively monitoring the impact of the global situation on its financial condition, liquidity and operations. As a result of the impacts of COVID-19 on the parishes, the Synod suspended the Diocesan assessments for nine months, resulting in a decrease in revenue of \$675,000.



Financial Statements for the Year Ended December 31, 2021

<u>Notes</u>

Balance Sheet

- The investments in the Anglican Balanced Fund performed strongly in 2021. At the end of the year, the unrealized gains on investments are \$1.018M (2020 loss of \$534K).
- During the year, there were withdrawals of \$1.0M from the Fund to provide cash flow. There were additions of \$1.85M in the Fund, mostly from the proceeds of sale of St. Mark's Church, Valleyfield and the proceeds of sale of St. Mary's Church, Kirkland. The Corporation of St. Mary's Church voted to cease operations at the end of October and therefore, the Synod assumed ownership of the investment resulting from the proceeds of sale of the church.

Statement of Operations

- Loss from operations of \$829K versus forecasted loss from operations of \$999K. Decrease of \$170K due to an increase in revenue of \$128K and a decrease in expenses of \$42K.
- Revenues of \$1.365M versus forecast of \$1.237M. Increase of \$128K result mostly of increase in donations of \$137K offset by decrease in investment revenue of \$4K. In November and December, donations totalling \$115K were received from four churches - Christ Church Cathedral, All Saints by the Lake (Dorval), St. Phillip's (Montreal West) and St. Paul's (Greenfield Park).
- Additional \$22K of donations received from Bishop's Action Appeal/Bishop's Annual Dinner Appeal to help the Synod fulfill commitments to local missions (Mile-End Community Mission, Action Réfugiés Montreal and Tyndale St-Georges Community Centre).
- Decrease in expenses of \$42K versus forecast due to the following:
 - \$18K decrease in Parish Development and Support (Sch 2)
 - Parish development decrease by \$7K fewer activities and events
 - Youth ministry decrease by \$9K fewer activities and events
 - Stewardship Council decrease by \$1K no activities and events
 - \$9K decrease in Parish Ministry and Chaplaincies (Sch 3)
 - Provision for sundry employment costs decrease by \$2K
 - Clergy assistance decrease by \$4K fewer clergy moves
 - \$5K decrease in Community Ministries (Sch 4)
 - \$7K decrease in Communication (Sch 5)
 - Anglican Montreal decrease by \$3K lower production costs
 - French translation decrease by \$4K no translations required
 - \$7K decrease in Standing Committee on Mission (Sch 6)
